# Civic Election Yesterday Was Noticeably Dull

people, acting without remuneration. It would be well to accord those who have done their work well merited praise. During his twelve years of civic experience, His Worship said, not a single cent has been misappropriated, nor has anything been done about which it was necessary to draw a veil of mystery. Though many unwarranted criticisms are made, the fact that the citizens can be trusted is amply demonstrated in the splendid vindication given the retiring council, as all the old councillors nominating have been returned, an excellent endorsement. In saying fare well to the Hall, His Worship expressed his thanks to the citizens, and expressed the opinion that some good measures have been accomplished for the good of the city as a whole. In introducing Mayor-elect T. W. L. Prowse, His Worship stated that as councillor for eight years, as chairman of the finance committee of the council, and as a member of a large and growing business concern the new mayor is well qualified to serve in his new position.

Councillor T. W. L. Prowse, Mayor-elect, extended his sincere thanks to the citizens for his election by acclamation, an event impossible to foresee when elected councillor eight years ago. The only regret expressed by Councillor Prowse was that Mayor Yeo must leave the chair. However, the example of the latter will be an incentive to give as much energy as possible in endeavoring to fill the responsible position in a manner similar to that of his predecessor, that the people may say "Prowse was a good man."

Each of the re-appointed and newly appointed members of the council expressed their thanks to the citizens for their election.

Councillor Dougan thought that if Councillor Prowse becomes half as good in his office as Mayor Yeo has been he would be all right. In regard to his own appointment Councillor Dougan expressed the opinion that four years of experience will enable him to serve his ward and the city better in the future than in the past. Councillor Reardon stated that he has always done his best to work in the interests of his ward in particular and the city in general.

Councillor McDougall promised to act as fair and square to the people in the future as he has done in the past. He hoped that during his second term office he might be of greater value to the city than in his first. He thought that Councillor Prowse, as mayor, would be as fair and square as his predecessor.

Councillor Foster expressed the opinion that the fact that all nominating councillors had been returned demonstrated the confidence which the people felt in the retiring council. Having done his best in the past the speaker resolved to do as well in the future.

Councillor Holman expressed the pleasure which has been his for the last two years of serving under Mayor Yeo. He promised to do as he has in the past, his best for Ward Four and the City.

Councillor Kennedy expressed his appreciation for the magnificent vote given him, the third occasion on which he has received such. He expressed his regret at no longer being associated in the Council with Mayor Yeo.

Dr. J. E. Blanchard referred to his recent two year rest from the Council. He thanked the citizens of Ward Five for their vote, and expressed the opinion that the City will have a good government for the next two years.

With a slogan, such as "Come to Canada and ski," the transportation companies next winter might attract thousands of visitors to Eastern Canada and the Rockies.

The British United Press Geneva correspondent paints a gloomy picture of Switzerland this year. "From Geneva," he says, "which is usually surrounded by snow-clad mountains throughout the winter, virtually the only snow visible is that on Mont Blanc. While it has been possible to maintain skating and bob-sledding, skiing has been impossible at middle and lower altitudes."

The brief reports which the London newspapers publish each day from Switzerland speak for themselves: "Snow patchy and thin below 4,000 feet." "One foot of snow." "No good snow below 5,000 feet." "Snow conditions very difficult." "Snow generally windswept." "Thawing."

On the other hand, other reports describe perfect conditions, but a day-to-day perusal of the reports show plainly to any skier that fully 50 per cent of the winter sports at the various resorts have been curtailed.

Here is Canada's opportunity! If a picture of the ideal conditions in the Dominion were supplied to the British winter-sports enthusiast, there is no doubt that hundreds would be attracted across the Atlantic. Tell this skier that he can reach some of the finest skiing country in the world within two hours of leaving the big Canadian cities in the east and west, and he will stop watching a Swiss thaw and come over right away. He will find Canadian conditions different, but he will find real snow, which appears to be lacking elsewhere.

**Seized Piston**

Due to lack of lubrication, a piston may seize, or freeze, in the cylinder. This is an unfortunate condition and may result in a large repair bill if the cylinder walls have been scored or cut. If the seizure is merely due to tightness without scoring, no damage has been done and the remedy is simple. Remove the spark plug and oiling cups, and pour kerosene into the cylinders on top of the pistons, allowing it to remain about one half hour. The kerosene will seep down past the piston rings, dissolving the gummed oil and wetting the cylinder walls. If scoring has not taken place the engine should be free to turn by hand. After the pistons have been freed, drain out all the kerosene and replace with engine oil. Then, run the engine until warm, and drain out this oil, as it is diluted with the kerosene which remained in the oil pan. After the correct amount of fresh oil has been placed in the oil pan, the engine will be ready for operation.
