Yesterday afternoon Dr. Dawson, City, who is ill at the house of his niece Miss Johnson, Esplanade, was reported to be slightly weaker with but little change otherwise.

The late W. C. Hobbick was under treatment in the P. E. I. Hospital five weeks. In yesterday's issue it was stated that his mother was a daughter of the late Judge Hensley instead of a sister.

The residence of David and Mrs. Jones, Pownal was the scene of a very pretty home wedding Wednesday evening, when their youngest daughter, Melinda Adeline, became the wife of John Heber Gordon, eldest son of Walter F. and Mrs. Gordon, Willowdale, Brudenell River. The ceremony was performed at six o'clock by Rev. H. W. Tombs, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, in the presence of immediate relatives of the bride and groom and a large number of invited guests.

The sad death of Upper Westmoreland on Tuesday last of Robert Oakes is deeply regretted by the community. The deceased who had been residing for the past twenty years in Butte, Mont., came home about two months ago and purchased a farm. He began to exhibit signs of mental trouble, especially in regard to the disposition of his farm which he sold and bought back several times. On Tuesday he was engaged in hanking the house. After hauling a load of hanking material after dinner, he took his horse to the barn, put away the animal and then committed suicide by hanging. His body was found ten minutes later by Robert Williams, who came to the barn to put his horse in. The deceased was about 40 years of age. He leaves a widow, but no family.

The tug William Aitken, Capt. Wm. H. Batt, has returned from Dalhousie where she was tender for the Government dredge St. Lawrence.

Capt. Batt was around Campbellton a good deal and when speaking to the Guardian representative yesterday referred in a very encouraging manner to the future of the fire swept town. He says the numerous activities of the town are proceeding as formerly, lumber mills employing 500 men are turning out the usual amount of work and the sea-going steamers and sailing vessels carrying the factory productions to other far distant lands. Shipping is almost as active as in the days before the fire. As to building operations Capt. Batt says that some splendid new buildings have gone up, among them some brick edifices. The town is being laid out practically in the same old manner, the waterworks system providing any change or improvement over its old equations. While many fine buildings have gone up there is not yet a church in Campbellton. The Roman Catholics, with commendable energy, have erected a shack devoted to this purpose while a building which serves during the week as a motion picture theatre is used by all the Protestant denominations, the different pastors officiating on alternate Sundays. Perhaps the biggest building contract there is the erection of a large J. C. R. round house and medical shops, probably the largest in the Maritime Provinces. The former is said to be intended to accommodate forty engines, while the shops will be fitted with the most modern facilities in the line of mechanical equipment. The order prevailing in the new Campbellton is good and of things in general Capt. Batt speaks very hopefully and expresses the opinion that Campbellton, in his opinion the ashes of the never to be forgotten 1910 fire, will become even a greater town than the most confident of its citizens ever anticipated.

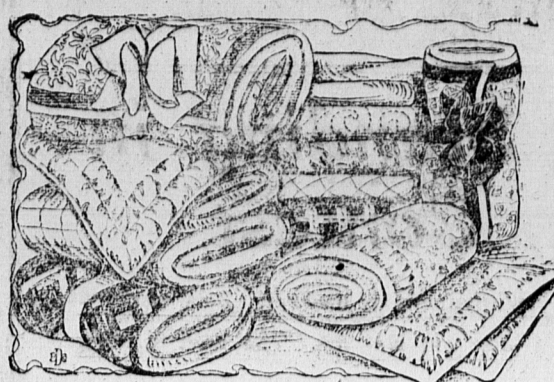
