SEMI FLOATING REAR AXLE The Semi Floating Rear Axle is the type in which the load is carried on the wheel and axle housing and the thrust taken care of by the two bearings at each end of the axle housing.

It contains a turned end on the axle housing and bearing in the wheel, besides usual key and key way.

The turned end on the housing fits into the bearing on the wheel but the wheel is not held in place by any retainer on the wheel end of the housing. The axle shaft is keyed onto the wheel hub and retained by the conventional nut cotter pin. The whole assembly is then installed, including the wheel.

There is an inspection cover on the differential which enables installation of two half collars on the axle shaft, which collar completed, fills the space between the axle housing and the differential planetary housing, and begin ceated as is the axle shaft, and the collar embracing the axle shaft tightly, prevents the whole assembly from coming out.

The end of the axle shaft is square and slides into compensating gears mounted in the differential case.

Que.—I have a noise under the floor board of my Model—Car, and cannot seem to locate the trouble. Can you advise me where to look for it? K. G. M., Kensington

Ans.—Inspect roller bearing in the drive shaft housing, being sure that it is packed with grease first. Inspect clutch rollers and pins, where usually the trouble lies.
