English Golfers Regain Ryder Cup

Hand United States Team Smashing Defeat After Americans Had Taken The Lead In Friday's Play.

MOORETOWN, April 27—British professional golfers today regained the Ryder Cup by a smashing victory in the singles after their United States rivals had established a bare lead in the foursomes play yesterday, five down to Geo Duncan at the luncheon recess. Walter Hagen found no opportunity to stage a comeback at the expense of the British captain. In the afternoon Duncan went out to play ten holes in 35 strokes, a performance his rival Captain could not match.

The Cup changed hands when young Henry Cotton won from Al Watrous, four and three, giving the points score of 6 1-2 enough, even if the United States should win the rights match which was not finished.

The point gained by the match made the score for the two days play ties at 2 1-2 to 2 1-2, as the Americans led by a point after the foursomes yesterday.

Farrell had no chance against Whitcombe's sterling game. The American open champion was two down at the first turn, six behind after eighteen holes and seven down at the 27th. The British went ahead in the Ryder cup contest when George Duncan returned a victory over Walter Hagen ten up and eight to play. Leo Diegel sent the Americans back level with the British by defeating Abe Mitchell nine up and eight to play a victory for Archie Compton over Gene Sarazen, six and five, gave the British the advantage in point scores 4 1-2 to 3 1-2, with four matches to be completed.

Will The Braves Be Braver?

Don't be surprised to see Hank Gowdy do a lot of the back-stopping for the Boston Braves during the Summer. In an earlier story we predicted that, in one of the exhibition games played against the Philadelphia Athletics at St. Petersburg this Spring, Gowdy went behind the plate along during the middle of the game and he deserved much credit for the Braves' victory. O' Hank seemed to pull the ability of the Tribe up to a point where it looked like a regular big league ball club. There were days at St. Pete when they played like a tallender in the Piedmont League.

Hank is still some backstop. He was taking his regular batting turn at St. Pete and it wouldn't be at all surprising to see him behind the platter in a lot of the Summer tilts. He's peppery and he gives the other players added confidence. While Gowdy is employed as a coach, his playing days are still not over.

The fans who follow the Braves can look for the club to play bang-up ball or be terrible. They don't look like a medium club in any sense of the word. They'll either win games by great and brilliant playing, or

drop then like a bunch of sandlot-ers. If they once start booting the ball, it seems to develop rapidly into an epidemic and they go all to pieces. Every player on the club is capable of making awful blunders just as every player on the team at times plays brilliantly. The Braves look to be in-and-outers for fair.

In Freddy Maguire the Braves have one of the classiest second basemen in the national pastime. Freddy is fast on his feet and can cover a lot of territory.

Last year he only hit .279 and his stick work therefore is not expected to break up any ball games. However, in his Spring training he seemed to be smashing the apple more efficiently. The Fuchs-Evers-Gowdy combination were apparently satisfied, because they were not having Maguire understudied to any large extent. This Boston team is not likely to have a heavy hitting infield, as Sisler who is the only fellow on the books who hit better than .300 last season.

The Braves had a great mob of pitchers working out during the training grind with Harry Selbold, who pitched for Reading in the International League last year, and Bruce Cunningham, who toiled

with Los Angeles in the Coast League in 1928, having the call on other rookies. Both are right-handers. Selbold, built along the lines of a Hack Wilson, appears to be a fairly capable hitter as well as a twirler.

Despite the fact that Bob Smith lost more games than he won last season, the Braves are likely to depend on the singing flinger as one of their standbys during the present campaign. Bob can render a touching ballad and, while that may not win ball games, it does help entertain the troupe during the long Summer evenings.

With Richbourg as a key man in the outfield, the Braves will have to build up a heavy hitting outer defense to make up for the weak hitting infield. They may have to develop some 300 swatters if they expect to finish anywhere in particular. Lou Leggett, a rookie catcher, hit .342 with Reading last year, and may help when it's his turn to work.

At St. Petersburg, Evers was talking about "inspired ball clubs" but it takes more than inspiration to win a pennant. Hitting and smooth fielding are most often the deciding factors.

MARITIME AND MAINE BOWLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Opens at St. John Early in May—Nova Scotia to Have Strong Teams.

HALIFAX, N. S. April 28—Probably a dozen teams will be on hand when the Maritime and Maine championship bowling tournament opens at Saint John early in May.

Nine teams, three from Nova Scotia, three from New Brunswick and a trio from Maine, competed last season. At least a dozen teams will compete for honors this season, with possibility of two or so more.

Bowling officials in the Maritimes count on Houlton, Eastport, Woodland, tact.

and Calais, Maine, to enter teams, while Saint John with three teams, Blacks, present champion, Y. M. C. I. and Imperials, Fredericton, Grant Falls and Moncton are to represent New Brunswick.

From Nova Scotia there will be two teams from Halifax, Conn and Martel's and Imperials, and one from Dartmouth. There is a possibility that the team of Halifax bowlers representing Truro last year will compete under the same colors this May.

Wilbur Martel, peer of Maritime willow splitters, is taking a strong team to Saint John in an effort to bring the big trophy to Halifax. The Halifax teams have always been rated as outstanding among the strong teams in tournaments in the last few years, but have failed to cop the cup. Martel has been leading individual bowler for some time.

Imperials, a new team, will send a strong team along, while Dartmouth rollers, Nova Scotia champions, will have their championship team in Calais will be a new team this season, as will the Imperials of Saint John.
