To Assume Guidance Of Eastern Peoples

PARIS, Jan. 2.—France plans to assume the guidance of the destinies of Armenia, Syria and Lebanon in the new order of world affairs growing out of the war in conformity with treaties signed with Great Britain and Russia in 1915, if the coming peace conference does not rule otherwise, according to authoritative information furnished the Associated Press. Palestine according to the plan under consideration would with its complexity of nationalities and religions be placed under international protection. England would be responsible for the Arabian peninsula with the exception of the kingdom of Hedjas which would be free.

Americans Recapture Village of Kadish

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Fees by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 90 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erects house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. GORV, C.M.G. Filing Claims Against Enemy Countries

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—Damage claims against enemy countries arising out of the war, are coming in to the state department in great numbers, classified under five general heads. They are of an infinite variety, some of them involving nice points of international law. Co-related with these claims are questions as to money owed in Canada to Germans by Canadians and stocks, securities and property owned in Canada by people of enemy countries. The claims aggregate thousands in number and millions in money total. They are passed on by a board of which Hon. Martin Burrell is chairman, with Mr. Thomas Mulvey, K. C., representing the State Department, Mr. C. C. Robinson the Justice Department and Mr. C. R. Forbith the Finance Department.

Montreal Brewers Want Law Repealed

MONTREAL, Dec. 28.—Montreal brewers have decided to ask the Federal Government to rescind the order in Council stopping the manufacture of beer after January 1919. They argue that the war regulation regarding barley is no longer being observed. The brewers contend the ban should be lifted. Brewers announced that if the regulation is kept in force steps will be taken in the courts to have it declared illegal.

PREMIER BORDEN REPRESENTS CANADA IN WELCOMING PRESIDENT

LONDON, Dec. 28.—Canada was officially represented at the Great Welcome to President Wilson in London Wednesday afternoon by Premier Borden and other Ministers, and also unofficially by hundreds of Canadian soldiers. The ministers spent a busy morning at the War Cabinet in conference, then drove to Charing Cross and took a prominent place among the Empire representatives. As the procession left the station Premier Borden was recognized by the thousands lining the street and was loudly acclaimed.

6,000,000 TONS SHIPS WITHIN THREE YEARS

Is France's Programme for Shipbuilding, 500,000 Tons Already Contracted for. Mediterranean Ports Will Be Utilized.

PARIS, Dec. 26.—It is understood the French ship-building programme calls for 6,000,000 tons within the next three years. The French Government already has placed orders for 500,000 tons in British shipyards and had hopes to place 800,000 tons in American yards. The aggregate after these additions will make France's shipping three times the merchant tonnage of France previous to the war. The increase is said to be due largely to changes by which the Mediterranean ports will become the centres of the commercial penetration of Europe instead of the North sea ports.

LONDON IS BUSY WITH ITS VISITORS

President Wilson Attends Conferences Preliminary to Peace Conference. Sir Robert Borden Attends King's Dinner to President Wilson.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—President Wilson along with the other overseas Premiers tonight. Several functions in honor of President Wilson are planned for Saturday. It is understood General Sir Arthur Currie, Commander of the Canadian Corps, will be in Paris throughout the conferences advising the Canadian delegates on military matters.

CANADIAN MINISTERS' CONFERENCE IN LONDON

Progress Reported on Trade, Transportation and Other Problems Affecting the Dominion. British Members Heartily Co-operating.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—After a brief Christmas rest the Canadian Cabinet Ministers who are in Britain held a long conference today at which the reports of those on the various committees and boards, showing the progress they are making in connection with the trade, transportation and other problems vitally affecting the Dominion, were considered. There is developing a spirit of hearty co-operation on the part of the British members of the various bodies with whom the Canadian overseas delegates are conferring which is a tribute to the status of the overseas and indicates an awakening of the Britishers to the keen competition for trade which faces the British Empire.

CANADIAN FORCE IN NORTHERN RUSSIA

Recently in Action Against Bolsheviki Consists of 375 Officers and Men With Two Six Gun Batteries.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—The following announcement was made by the Government: The Canadian force operating in northern Russia which was recently reported to have been in action against the Bolsheviki consists of 375 officers and men with two six gun batteries of 18 pounds, with a personnel of 375 officers and men in addition—88 officers and northern Russians to resist Bolshevian commissioned officers serving in aggression and to prevent the Bolsheviki from seizing huge stores of Archaengel under the authority where which had been provided by the Russian Government at Archangel. Tragedy in Hospital At Baltimore, Md.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 28.—Dr. Mobery Ishida, a Japanese and a member of the Medical Staff of the Sheppard Pratt Hospital here, shot and instantly killed Dr. George B. Wolfe, another physician of the hospital in the office of the institution today. Jealousy over one of the nurses prompted the deed, according to the police, who said that Ishida told them he shot Wolfe because he was jealous of him. Hospital physicians, who disarmed Dr. Ishida, declared, however, that he told them that Dr. Wolfe had constantly accused him of being a Japanese spy, and had circulated false reports regarding his conduct towards the nurses in the hospital.

Sinn Fein Prisoners Playing Revolution

BELFAST, Jan. 2.—Sinn Fein prisoners here have barricaded themselves in the wings of the jail and declared their defiance of the authorities, military officers reported today. The prisoners are said to have provided themselves for a long siege. They have hoisted a Socialist flag improvised from a bed coverlet and are playing revolutionary airs on instruments made from kitchen utensils.

Peace Commission For Chile and Peru

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—The Government of Canada has given its approval of a treaty recently negotiated between Great Britain and the Republics of Chile and Peru, providing for the establishment of a Peace Commission. These treaties are similar to those concluded between the United Kingdom and the United States at Washington in September 1914.

Poland Has Issued Ultimatum to Germany

WARSAW, Dec. 29.—The Polish Government has issued an ultimatum to Germany demanding the right of passage by Polish troops over German held railways to Vilna, which city is threatened by the Bolsheviki.
