CABINET MEETS TO DECIDE ON HOUSE OPENING

Some Cabinet Ministers Would Prefer Postponing Session Until After Christmas.

MANY RUMORS

It is Said that Hon. Mr. Graham May Go to Senate.

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Strong doubt was expressed in the cabinet this morning as to the House of Commons opening on Dec. 10 as expected when the members of the government assembled in the cabinet council this afternoon. The most important question on the order paper was to decide whether or not parliament would be called for Dec. 10. The government had decided to call parliament and proceed with the opening formalities, providing that the members were not able to take their seats on the opening day would be in the House before the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne had proceeded very far. It is said today however that there is some opposition to the opening of parliament without having the full quota of its members present. There are some ministers in the cabinet who do not favor an immediate session but prefer postponing the opening until after Christmas. An announcement is expected at the conclusion of the meeting.

It was learned last night that 15 to 20 of the final returns have not yet been received by the chief electoral officer who will make his report to the government today. A ten day notice must be given for summoning of the members.

Premier King has not yet intimated whether he will take part in the by-election campaign in Bagot or not.

Mr. T. L. Church, Conservative member for Toronto northwest has placed on the order paper of the House of Commons two motions requesting the development and deepening of the St. Lawrence River. He also proposes a treaty between Canada and United States for the purpose of immediate development and generation of power.

EVACUATION OF COLOGNE ZONE BEGINS

(Canadian Press) COLOGNE, Nov. 30.—British troops began evacuation of the occupied Cologne zone this morning a day earlier than arranged and before the signature of the Locarno security agreement which takes place tomorrow in London.

Occupation of the bridgehead was undertaken by the British seven years ago under stipulations of the treaty of Versailles. The treaty provides for evacuation after five years on condition that Germany fulfilled the stipulations of the treaty. The period was extended when the Allies found she had not carried out the disarmament provisions of the treaty.

Peasants Accused Of Burning Gypsies

MOSCOW, Nov. 30.—Twenty-six peasants are being tried for murder for the burning alive of two gypsies in the village of Kavezino, near Moscow. The superstitious peasants suspected the gypsies of bringing them misfortune, and 300 of them attacked the gypsies. When the victims had been beaten senseless, the peasants built a bonfire, and ripping the clothes from their bodies, placed them in the flames.

JANUARY 7TH FIXED AS DATE FOR OPENING OF PARLIAMENT

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Parliament will meet January 7, Premier King announced tonight at the conclusion of the meeting of the cabinet. The Prime Minister stated that it had been the hope of the government to meet Parliament Dec. 10, which was the first tentative date announced but reports of the chief electoral officer which was placed before the cabinet this afternoon showed it was clearly impracticable to summon Parliament at this early date. The Premier issued the following statement:

"The government has received today the following memo from the chief electoral officer with respect to the possibility of Parliament meeting on December 10."

1. "It now appears extremely improbable that by Dec. 10 all the members elected on October 29th last will have been returned."

2. "The returns of 215 out of 241 writs have been gazetted and since the special issue of the Canada Gazette, Nov. 28, regular returns have been received from 11 additional electoral districts making a total of 226, leaving 15 out of 241."

It is understood that Ramsay MacDonald, former Premier and other prominent personages have been invited to attend the signing.
