### Migratory Birds Regulations

The Minister of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, has just issued the Regulations regarding migratory birds for the current year. A summary of the Regulations as they apply to Prince Edward Island follows:

**Open Seasons**  
Ducks, Geese (other than Brant) — October 9 — November 22.  
Brant — October 23 — November 22.  
Wilson's Snipe — October 16 — November 15.  
Woodcock — October 1 — October 31.

**Close Seasons**  
There is a close season throughout the year on Wood Ducks, Swans, Cranes, all shore birds except Wilson's Snipe and Woodcock, and all migratory non-game and insectivorous birds.

The possession of migratory game birds killed during the open season is allowed in Prince Edward Island until January 31 following the open season.

### Signals Keep Coast Guard, Navy On Alert

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 19 (AP) — S.O.S. signals traced to a small kite-flying fishing boat kept Coast Guard and Navy searchers on the go for four hours today.

A Coast Guard search plane finally located the sender of the distress calls — cranked out through the kite antenna on an emergency device incapable of giving other information.

It was in tow of another fishing boat, 75 miles south of here. The boats were identified through registration numbers on their sides as the Alene of San Pedro (in town) and the Ginger of San Diego.

The destroyer, which sped to the scene, advised the Coast Guard that the Alene had a bad leak in the port quarter seam. The Perry said it would pump out the disabled craft and tow it into port here.

In any day: Ducks (exclusive of Mergansers), 7; Geese (including Brant), 5; Wilson's Snipe, 8; Woodcock, 3.

In any open season: Ducks (exclusive of Mergansers), 100; Geese and Brant, in the aggregate, 25; Woodcock, 100; Wilson's Snipe, 50; Geese, 10.

### Guns, Appliances and Hunting Methods

**Forbidden** — The use of a pump or repeating shotgun with a magazine that has not been permanently plugged or altered so that it cannot carry more than one shell in the magazine, an automatic (auto-loading), swivel or shotgun loaded with a single bullet, or any gun larger than number 10 gauge, or any weapon other than a gun or a bow and arrow, and the use of live birds as decoys or of any aeroplane, power-boat, sail-boat, sneak-boat, or night-light, or shooting from any motor or wheeled vehicle or a vehicle to which a draught animal is attached.

The hunting of migratory game birds by the use or aid of baiting with grain or other artificial food is prohibited.

### FURRIERS PONDER LENGTH OF SKIRTS

LONDON, Aug. 19 (CP)—Furriers, pondering the next change before sunrise or later than one-half hour after sunset is prohibited. The penalty for violation of the migratory bird laws is a fine of not more than Three Hundred Dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or both fine and imprisonment.
