**J. W. Beaton Heads "Y" War Service**



**TORONTO, Nov. 15**—The appointment of J. W. Beaton of Montreal as National Secretary for War Services, has been announced by the National Council of Y. M. C. A.'s of Canada. Mr. Beaton will give executive direction to the military service work of the Association throughout Canada, and overseas. This service has already assumed large proportions and is increasing rapidly as war preparations progress.

Mr. Beaton, who has been the General Secretary of the Montreal Y. M. C. A. for the past twenty years, had a wide experience in the last war as Senior Y. M. C. A. Officer with the Canadian Corps in France, Belgium, and on the Rhine. Under Mr. Beaton's direction the Y. M. C. A. distributed physical comforts to Canadian soldiers, provided over a million dollars worth of buildings and equipment, organized games and athletics, concerts and movies, and maintained canteen service in the Canadian Corps area as far forward as transportation could be provided. As an integral part of the Canadian Corps, as many as one hundred Y. M. C. A. centres were maintained at one time within the Canadian Corps area.

Mr. Beaton has been Metropolitan Secretary, Y. M. C. A., Montreal, since 1919; served in the World War as Honorary Major and Senior Y. M. C. A. Officer, Canadian Corps, France and Belgium, mentioned in despatches; represented Canada at the Conference of Institute of Pacific Relations, Honolulu, 1927, and Yosemite, 1936, has lectured extensively in Canada and the United States on political situation in the Far West; member Canadian Boy Scout Council; Canadian Institute of International Affairs; a Freemason; and in his church connection an Anglican.

**MISS JOSEPHINE VILLET**

On Nov. 2 last, the community of Victoria and surrounding districts were shocked to learn that Miss Josephine Villet had passed away in Prince George Hospital. Miss Villet had not been in robust health for some time previous to her entrance into the hospital, but she had continued to carry on her work as usual. On the advice of her medical attendant she then entered the hospital for treatment preparatory to an operation, but after a time other complications set in which nullified the efforts of her physician, and she died on Saturday, November 11, 1939, at the age of 74 years. She was a young woman of exceptional worth, upright and kindly in all her relations with others, and she will be sadly missed by all her friends and neighbors.
