PROMISES SCANDAL IN NEW YORK SUIT

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—An explosion is promised in the trial of Harvey Wiley Corbett, a well known architect, and his associate John Qualey, a promoter, who are both accused by Mrs W. L. Bull, widow of an eminent New York surgeon, and former wife of James G. Blaine, Jr., of swindling her out of \$35,000 which she says she gave them for investment in a magnesia company.

While arguments were being heard today on a writ of habeas corpus, Qualey jumped up and called to Charles L. Craig, counsel for Mrs Bull, “Craig, why don't you tell this whole thing? It'll all come out soon, and it's going to make a big scandal.”

“Tell anything you want to,” retorted Mr Craig.
John F. McIntyre, counsel for the defendants, asserted today that both his clients were innocent and honorable men, and that there was \$10,000,000 worth of business on Corbett's desk now awaiting his attention. Mrs Bull is equally sure of her case and was insistent today on pressing it forward.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there, on Tuesday, the second day of August, one thousand nine hundred and ten years, and at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in quarterly session, and was constituted by the moderator pro tempore, John Murray, with whom were present: W. H. Spencer, E. J. Rattee, W. A. Mason, A. B. McLeod, George E. Ross, A. S. Stewart, A. Craise, F. McNeill, John Hawley, John Gillis, D. McKenzie, D. B. McLeod, R. P. Murray, H. W. Toombs, D. Fraser, A. D. McKenzie, J. W. McKenzie, W. I. Green, John Sterling, A. D. Sterling, ministers; James Moar, T. C. James, Hon. B. Rogers, elders.

Revs. Dr. Grant, Dr. Coffin, A. F. Robb and P. S. Coffin being present, were invited to sit and correspond. Minutes of meetings held on May 10th, 13th, 31st, June 14th and 29th were read and sustained. John Murray was elected moderator of Presbytery for the ensuing six months.

John Murray was nominated moderator of the forthcoming Synod. A. J. McNeill, John Gillis and Geo. E. Ross reported on their attendance at the General Assembly.

The clerk read the report of the Presbyterial of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. The report was received, the work of the society commended and Messrs. Ross and Spencer appointed to draft a suitable resolution in connection with this report and submit it to the Presbytery. Elders' commissions were received from the following sessions, and their names ordered to be placed on the roll of the Presbytery, namely, Zion, Charlottetown; Alberton, Cavendish, Georgetown, Wood Islands, Richmond Bay East, Princetown, Souris, Murray Harbor South, New London, Montague, Marshfield, Cardigan, Strathalbyn, Valleyfield.

The clerk was authorized to receive and place on roll the names of Presbytery elders duly appointed and transmitted to him in favor of D. A. Bruce, Hon. B. Rogers, Hammond Toombs, George Parker, Donald McRae, Joseph Simmons, Thomas McPhee, Charles McGregor, James Moar, L. H. D. Foster, James Gillis, D. McDonald, William Munroe, respectively.

On motion, the following were nominated to act on Synod's standing committees:—

Education, T. F. Fullerton; Sabbath Schools, R. G. Sinclair; Young People's Societies, D. Fraser; Moral and Social Reform, R. G. Strathie; Systematic Giving, Geo. Miller; Bills and Overtures, R. P. Murray; Synod and A. Craise; Widows' and Orphan's Fund, A. B. McLeod; Century Church and Manse Building Fund, John Gillis; Church Life and Work, E. J. Rattee; Tenure of Church Property, Lieut. Gov. Rogers; Evangelism, Geo. E. Ross; Committee to nominate Standing Committees, W. H. Spencer.

Geo. E. Ross, convener, D. Fraser, and E. J. Rattee were appointed a committee to consider the matter of recruiting men for the ministry, and to report to the next quarterly meeting of Presbytery.

T. C. James addressed the Presbytery on Foreign Missions.
Dr. Coffin, Trinidad, spoke of his work in that country, and stated many interesting and encouraging facts, indicating success and progress.

A. F. Robb made statements in regard to his work in Korea, and presented numerous features of interest and advancement.
Presbytery adjourned to meet at the same place at the hour of a quarter to two, of which public intimation was made and this sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

Same place and date, the Presbytery met, pursuant to adjournment at a quarter to two, and was constituted by the moderator, John Murray. Sederunt ad supra.
E. J. Rattee gave notice of motion to reconsider Presbytery's former decision in regard to the printing of the minutes.

T. C. James moved the following motion which was seconded by John Gillis, and carried:—
That the ministers of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island consult their sessions and congregations as far as possible, with a view to our assuming the support of Rev. Dr. Coffin in place of Rev. A. D. McKenzie, who, in the Providence of God, has been compelled to retire from the mission field.

It was further, on motion, agreed that the Presbytery meet in special sessions in St. James' Hall on the Tuesday of Exhibition week at 10 a. m. to deal with this matter and any other necessary business.
Presbytery then adjourned to meet on Tuesday, 16th inst., at Lot 14 at 9:30 a. m., and at Lot 16 on the same day at 2:30, of which public intimation was made, and this sederunt was closed with the Benediction.
