TERRIBLE SCENES AT JUAREZ AFTER ITS SURRENDER TO REBELS

Federal Troops Almost Entirely Without Provision For Surgical and Medicinal Care—Soldiers Found Suffering From Wounds And Typhoid Fever.

JUAREZ, May 12.—That the insurrectos' army is more than an armed mob was shown today by the absence of general looting and intoxication and the quickness with which the shattered city was cleared of its dead and wounded. The embargo against visitors was removed during the day and sight-seers in thousands poured across the bridges from El Paso. Only occasional cases of looting were reported and these not by the insurrectos themselves, but by

insatiable curiosity hunters, one of whom triumphantly displayed in El Paso two silver candlesticks, taken from the church in which the federals made a desperate stand.

The insurrectos are not overlooking the possibility of attack from Colonel Rabago, reported approaching from Chihuahua with a relief force. The rebel leaders will not divulge their plans in this direction, but it is known that surprise from the south is carefully guarded against. Juarez contains the largest part of Mexico's original force of 1,940 men, augmented by several forces of volunteers, who, during the day enlisted under the banner of the victorious rebel army, and were armed with captured rifles.

Now that the battle of Juarez has been fought and won, even the insurrecto leaders are wondering somewhat at the easiness of the capture of the city that had almost seemed impregnable. With a well drilled force of regulars, thoroughly armed with field and machine guns, posted at strategic points, the garrison was out-fought and out-manuevered and surrendered to a force of insurrectos that at most did not number more than 600 or 700 fighting men. An explanation may be found in the expressions of federal prisoners. A number of the wounded expressed sympathy with the insurrecto cause, while others, unwounded but disarmed, openly fraternized with the rebels. "The federals simply would not fight," epitomized the belief in the insurrecto ranks.

That the Mexican federal forces were almost entirely without provision for surgical and medical care was shown yesterday when Red Cross surgeons and nurses from El Paso went to the captured city and took charge of the barracks and other temporary field hospitals, where scores of wounded awaited their care.

Three or four federals were found in an old house that had been used by the troops as a hospital. They were suffering from wounds that had been inflicted in the fighting around Casas nearly two months ago. They had received no care since that time. Hollowed eyed skeletons with gangrenous wounds, gazed silently at the Red Cross workers as they set to work with disinfectants and water, to remove the stench that prevailed everywhere. In one room, stripped and thrown in a heap, were found four dead bodies, bloated and disfigured.

In another room shut off from sunlight and fresh air were half a dozen other men who had lost all semblance of human beings, suffering from erysipelas or typhoid fever. Another typhoid patient, all but naked, lay on the ground outside the door of one of the unventilated rooms.

Over the mouth and eyes of the dying man hovered swarms of flies. Another emaciated man merely pointed to his leg, broken by a bullet at Casas Grandes. A rough board stretching from the hip to the ankle, had been bound to the fractured limb. The bandages had not been touched since the lumber splint was applied. Another trooper, with his thigh shattered by a bullet at Casas Grandes, had only bandages around the wound. He, too, had received no attention since the fight.

A number of other wounded men were in such septic condition that the nurses did not dare touch them until they had put on rubber gloves. Another man, lying on the floor in one room were five wounded men. One was dying of a shot through the lungs. He had received attention from a woman who crouched at the side of the unconscious man, fanning the flies from his face and weeping silently. Eight cases of typhoid fever in all, were found by the Red Cross corps at this one hospital. One was a raving maniac. Pervading everything was the host of flies.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN ON CANADIAN CROPS AND STOCK

OTTAWA, May 12.—A bulletin of the Census Office issued today makes the following report on the crops and live stock of Canada.

The seeding and growing season for the whole of Canada has opened late this year, and the month of April has been marked by hard frosts. But May has been favorable to cultivation of the land, and the rainfall has been sufficient for healthy vegetation.

Fall wheat, which is grown chiefly in Ontario and Alberta, showed an average condition of 82 per cent. at the end of April, being 80 per cent. in Alberta and 81 per cent. in Ontario. In Ontario however the April frosts were destructive in some regions; and from 12 to 34 per cent. of the area sown has been reported as winter-killed. The central counties of Lake Ontario, suffered worst, the average loss as reported being 34 per cent. In the western counties 27 per cent. of the area in crop has been destroyed. In the southern counties, north of Lake Erie, the loss is 10 per cent.; in the northern counties and districts, 12.6 per cent.; and in the eastern counties, between the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers, 15 per cent. For the whole of Canada the area winter-killed is reported to be 21 per cent., and the per cent. condition of the growing crop is 82. About 12 per cent. of the clover was heaved out by the spring frosts, and the average condition of hay and clover at the end of April was 89 per cent. Alberta shows better than any other part of Canada, its average being 94 per cent. Nova Scotia comes next, with 93.75; and in Quebec, British Columbia and Saskatchewan the condition is over 90. In Ontario it is 86 and in Manitoba 85 per cent.

The percentage of total seeding completed at the end of April was 21.35 in Quebec, 44 in Ontario, 47 in Manitoba, 47.30 in Saskatchewan, 66.81 in Alberta and 76.90 in British Columbia. Manitoba and Saskatchewan had 70 per cent. of the proposed area of spring wheat sown at the end of April, and Alberta and British Columbia 80 per cent. The Maritime Provinces had scarcely made a beginning of seeding operations at the end of April, and in Quebec barely one-fourth of the spring wheat, oats and barley were sown. In Ontario 51 per cent. of the spring wheat was in the ground, 44 per cent. of the oats and 42 per cent. of the barley.

The report on the condition of live stock is good for all the Provinces,—being 95 for horses, 92.43 for milk cows, 90.56 for other cattle, 93.32 for sheep and 94.51 for swine. Alberta is below 90 for horses, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia for other cattle, and Alberta and British Columbia for sheep; but generally the condition ranges about 90 per cent.

FRENCH VILLAGE HAS ITS CRIPPEN

Woman Strangled by Ex-Convict and Her Body Buried in Scullery.

PARIS, May 6.—A man named Victor Gaubert has been arrested in the village of La Penne, near Marseilles, for the murder of his wife under circumstances which are curiously like those of the Crippen case.

Victor Gaubert was an engineer in the french fleet. But he struck his superior officer, and was sentenced to twenty years' hard labor. He served nine years, and was then set at liberty for good conduct.

Some years ago Gaubert and his wife Eliza came to live in the Villa Rosita at La Penne. On October 10 last Eliza disappeared. Her husband told the neighbors that she had gone to Mauritius to visit her family. He expressed great grief at her desertion of him, saying that she had gone without his permission, and that he believed that she was in love with another man.

Soon afterwards Gaubert announced his wife's death, and after some months he married a girl named Antonia Stollas at La Penne. The two lived at the Villa Rosita until three days ago, when Gaubert's lease expired, and the landlord took possession of the house.

Some necessary repairs had to be made, and making them the workmen noticed that tiles in the flooring of the scullery had been taken up and put down again unevenly. They took them up again, saw that the earth beneath showed signs of disturbance, and a little way down they found the body of Eliza Gaubert.

The body was where it was, and the workmen informed the police, who took possession of the house. Later on the body was subjected to medical examination, as a result of which the doctors declared that the woman was strangled.

Yesterday morning Gaubert was asked by the landlord to come to see him at the Villa Rosita. When he arrived there he was arrested and taken into the scullery. At the sight of his wife's body he burst into tears and confessed that he had buried her.
