Referring to scripture and ancient history, the preacher said that these alike bore testimony to the evils of indulgence in strong drink, and lifted the voice of warning against its use and its consequences. Temperance work and legislation had suffered a setback of late years, owing to the apathy and weakness of its supporters, from which the advocates of alcohol had derived an advantage in the carrying on of a whispering campaign to discredit the good cause and to upset the enactment and enforcement of prohibition. But the tide was turning back again in favor of restriction of the sale of intoxicants.

TORONTO, Oct. 30—The world wants hard-boiled business men and against the educational trend that is developing such two-fisted office fighters at the expense of imaginative "builders." Dr. Lois Hayden Meek of Teachers' College, New York finds little assistance among teachers.

"Our society wants hard-boiled business men, not dreamers," she told the annual conference of the national federation of kindergarten, nursery school, and kindergarten-primary teachers.

"The inventor with us is a queer duck," the social experimenter is a red; the philosopher is a dreamer. We give approbation to a creative person only when he succeeds, because our gods are success."

Dr. Meek thought that "playing house" games by children should be encouraged. She said teachers themselves were not too inspiring when it came to creation.
