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Wolfville Loses Only Hostelry Building Completely Razed By Fierce Blaze—Fire Damage Estimated At \$30,000

Tells Of Horror



WOLFVILLE, N. S., Dec. 6. (By the Canadian Press)—Fire damage estimated at \$30,000 tonight left this town without a hotel for the winter. Fire starting at eight o'clock in a chimney of the Evangeline Inn gutted the main portion of the building within an hour. It was brought under control by the local apparatus, and fire equipment which was rushed from Kentville. Ice-coated roofs handicapped the fire-fighters. One, John Murphy, fell from a slippery porch roof, but escaped with severe bruises. Evangeline Inn is the only year-round hotel in Wolfville, the other hostelry operating only during the summer season.

THE SINO-JAPANESE SITUATION

Chinese Gov't. Has Decided Not To Evacuate Chinchow—Clash on Much Larger Scale Foreseen.

(Canadian Press) NANKING, Dec. 6.—The Chinese Government has decided not to evacuate Chinchow and will order its troops to resist in the event of a Japanese attack, an official spokesman said tonight. At the same time Foreign Minister Wellington Koo withdrew his resignation and decided to carry on after unanimous appeal from government officials. News that Dr. Alfred Sze, Chinese delegate to the League Council, had also rescinded his resignation was confirmed in official sources.

The Government spokesman made his statement in connection with dispatches from Mukden via Tokyo, saying that General Honjo had communicated with Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang at Peking and insisted that he withdraw his soldiers from the Chinchow area. Referring to the League Council's resolution looking toward a neutral zone, the spokesman said China ob-

Italy Launches Seventh Cruiser

This is the seventh and last of the 10,000 ton type cruisers decided upon by Italy after the disarmament conference in 1921. It presents a record in construction speed. Its keel was laid at the beginning of the year. Thousands of navy men gathered to celebrate at the same time the fiftieth anniversary of the foundation of the naval academy here.

Gandhi Issues Manifesto On Leaving England

LONDON, Dec. 6.—(A.P.)—The demands of the India National Congress, headed by complete independence for India, were set forth in a parting manifesto from Mahatma Gandhi to the British people issued last night through the Commonwealth of India League. Independence, the Mahatma declared in his manifesto, does not exclude "partnership at will on absolutely equal terms with Britain and to be determined at the instance of either party." The document was accepted as of high importance in political circles as it was looked upon as an unusually precise and clear exposition of the views of the congress. HELPLESS IN NORTH SEA AFTER CRASH

British and Danish Steamers Collide, the Latter In Sinking Condition.

HULL, England, Dec. 6. (A.P.)—The British trawler St. Gatten, arriving here with her bows flattened, reported today she had been in a collision with the Spanish steamer Amotegi Mendi off Flamborough Head in the North Sea and that the latter was flying distress signals when seen last night. A message from Bridlington said an S. O. S. had been received from the Spanish steamer Manu saying she was helpless in a gale 100 miles off that point in the North Sea and her fuel was exhausted. BANKOG, Siam, Dec. 6. (A.P.)—Five Europeans were killed today when a Dutch airmail plane crashed in taking off on the return flight. Their names could not immediately be learned. Two others were injured including Colonel Brinsmead, controller of civil aviation in Australia.

Canada And Brazil Sign Agreement

(Special to The Guardian) RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 5.—The commercial agreement between Brazil and Canada was signed provisionally at the Foreign Ministry today. The signing of the agreement was provisional, because it must have the approval of the Canadian Parliament before becoming effective.

Brazil Has Coffee Surplus

(Special to The Guardian) RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 5.—The Brazilian Coffee Council today asked for suggestions for turning the surplus stock of coffee into combustibles, hoping to derive a revenue from the 12,000,000 sacks of low grade coffee now awaiting disposition. A brewery here has been mixing coffee with creosote, raw tar and pitch and has reported that the product is comparable to second grade coal as a fuel.

Moncton Lodges Hold Meetings

(Canadian Press) MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 6.—Local lodges of the running trades operating on this division of the Canadian National Railways held special meetings over the weekend. Union officers were unwilling to state what action was being taken, though it was expected the proposed wage-cut of ten percent recommended by the conciliation board's majority report would be discussed and votes taken on its acceptance or rejection.

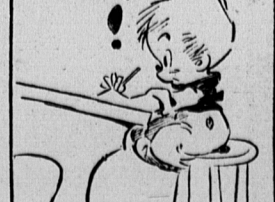
