RUSSIAN RAILWAY FAILURE.

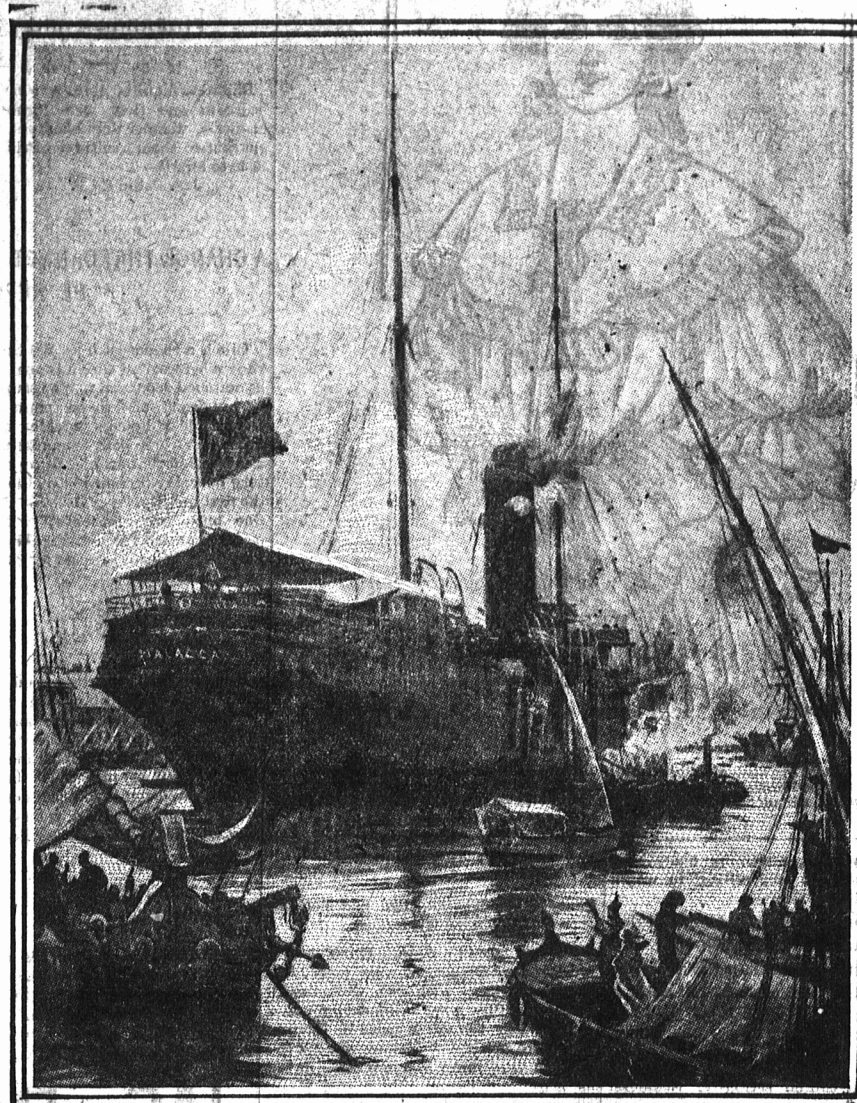
Advices from the front declare the Russian reverse is the result of the last four months failure and demoralization of the railroad.

WHAT HAPPENED IN JULY.

A FIRE SCORCHES HALIFAX CITY

One Life is Sacrificed and Over a Half Million Dollars in Property is Destroyed

The Flames Fanned by the Heavy Gale Swept Over Lower Water Street of the Garrison City. List of the Sufferers. The Fire Now Under Control.

HALIFAX SUFFERS BY FIRE.

HALIFAX, Sept. 15 (Special)—With the wind blowing a gale a fire broke out this afternoon in the fish-drying establishment of N. & M. Smith, Lower Water Street, destroying that plant also a French boarding house, Doyle's warehouse, Collins' Market, Egan's store, the Plant Line Steamship office, A. G. Jones warehouse and other places south.

LOSS OF LIFE AND HALF MILLION.

The loss is already half a million. A man named Nickerson lost his life by five wires during the excitement.

AN ENERGETIC FIGHT.

The firemen, the Imperial troops and tow boats are fighting bravely to stay the advance of the flames.

OTHER BUILDINGS BURNED.

Robertson's brick hardware and G. P. Mitchell's warehouse are burning, also White's stove shop and there is great danger that the flames may cross Water St. and work westward.

FIRE UNDER CONTROL.

The fire was got under control at five-thirty o'clock after heroic work of the fire brigade.

Two Hours With Jessie Mac-lachlan and Company

A Splendid Audience Roused to Great Enthusiasm by the Fair Scottish Vocalist.

There was a splendid audience both as to numbers and quality in the fine new Market Hall last evening to greet Miss Jessie MacLachlan and her Concert Company. Very many of them had heard the famous Scottish vocalist on a former occasion and were prepared to be enthusiastic. Their expectations were realized. For two hours all present were thrilled and delighted. For her first number, *Sound the Pibroch*, there was hearty and prolonged applause. Her second number was a double, including a Gaelic song, followed by *Blue Bonnets*. Again, as after her first song the audience would not be denied, and *Mary of Argyll* was sung. It might have been thought that the high water mark of enthusiasm had now been reached, but it was destined to rise still higher as the duet, the *Crooket Bawbee* was imitatively sung by Miss MacLachlan and Mr. Young and higher yet in her closing solo, *Rule Britannia*. Space will only permit brief mention of the splendid cello solos of Mr. McLinden four in number, in every one of which the vibrant strings spoke directly to the heart of his auditory, and the varied melodies of Mr. Young, which included the old favorites *Afton Water*, *Annie Laurie* and the *Macgregor's Gathering*. All were heartily encored. The evening closed with *Auld Lang Syne* by Miss MacLachlan with cello accompaniment by Mr. McLinden. Mr. Young joining in the chorus. It was altogether a delightful concert, and especially so to lovers of Scottish Melody. All who shared in the enjoyment, and the numbers were large for such inclement weather, will join in the hope that Miss MacLachlan and her company may speedily return to our city.

S. S. STANLEY LOSES HER MAST

And the Marconi Apparatus attached to it

In the Storm of Yesterday—Vessels Go Ashore in Numbers in Pictou Harbor

During the storm yesterday afternoon the S. S. Stanley which was at anchor in Pictou harbor waiting to go on the dry dock had her topmast broken off by the gale. The Marconi apparatus which was attached was carried down with the falling of the mast.

A number of vessels that were at anchor in the harbor broke their moorings and were carried on the shore some below the town on the north side and others on the south.

Among the five or six vessels that thus went ashore were the Baltic and the Alma both of Charlottetown.

PROSPEROUS FARMER SUICIDES.

AMHERST, September 13.—This morning between five and six o'clock, Abel Smith, a prosperous and respected farmer, suicided by shooting at his home Truemanville ten miles from Amherst. His family of two sons and two daughters knew he had been despondent, particularly during the last fortnight, but never thought of him taking his life.

FAMOUS TROTTER DYING.

TOPEKA, Sept. 13.—Dan Patch, the famous bay pacing stallion, brought here to go against his record at the World's Fair, is at the point of death. He is suffering from strangulated hernia. The veterinary surgeon says the crisis will come in the morning and that they have a chance to save the horse's life.

SUICIDE IN PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 13.—Joseph W. Leathers, a lawyer and newspaper worker of this city, committed suicide today by hanging, while temporarily unsound of mind. His body was found in the garret of his lodging house here. Mr. Leathers was 33 years old. For the past two years he has been editor of the Portland Advertiser.

THE STORM OF YESTERDAY

The storm yesterday afternoon was one of the worst witnessed on the Charlottetown harbor front for a long time. The harbor was a boiling mass of white caps and the waves dashed with great force against and over the wharves.

Only one vessel rode at anchor in the storm. She remained safely through the storm. The vessels fastened to the wharves had in many instances narrow escapes from being dashed to pieces. Hawseers were repeatedly broken and all the efforts in the crews were needed to keep them from being damaged.

No reports of wrecks along the coast reached the city up till last night. The Acadia with the MacLachlan party came into port about three o'clock, before the storm had reached its height.

The City of London which was to run to West River did not leave her dock during the afternoon.

The Halifax arrived last night about eight o'clock. The trip from Hawkesbury to this port was a very rough one.

The Hillsboro ferry boat had a rough time but managed to make her regular trips to Southport.

Around the city the gale played havoc in many places. A large tree was blown down near W. W. Clarke's, Hillsboro Square and another at Brighton met a similar fate carrying down the electric light wires.
