Baseball Men Agree That Babe Has It All Over Hornsby

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Those fans who regard baseball as a phase of competitive commerce are having a smile these days. It is not the Cobb-Speaker episode that furthest wishes the reason for laughter, but the feat of Rogers Hornsby to the Giants for Frank Frisch and Jimmy Rlin.

"Undoubtedly," says a Boston observer, "in obtaining the prize batman of the National League, McGraw's vision of offsetting the drawing power of Babe Ruth and the Yankees will be somewhat realized. Yet Hornsby has by no means the colorful personality of Ruth. He lacks the appeal to the imagination, the hazardous uncertainty of the latter. His craftsmanship with the bat is cool and precise, like a bit of well regulated machinery. He is not and never has been the great showman and American, particularly New Yorkers, date on good showmanship. Ruth has it. There is a certain magnetism about the big slugger, whose ability to turn the miraculous at the chosen moment has endeared him to the game's public."

"Hornsby, when in form, hits more specialties. They are too much like those made every day by other players for that."

"Hornsby is reckoned by shrewd baseball men as being the nearest approach to a perfect batter that ever took part in the game. It is said that his eyes are sharper and his coordination more accurate than that of any one else. His star dom is of the purest ray and McGraw is willing to experiment with him in the psychology of spinning the turnstiles."

Rickard Predicts Five New Ring Champs

Future Annual Glimpse Into Fistic

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Taking a annual glimpse into the fistic future book, Tex Rickard today predicted that five new boxing champions will be crowned in 1927.

The promoter, in a signed story published in the Evening World, named Mickey Walker, Pete Latzo, Sammy Mandell and Charley (Phil) Josenberg as the titleholders he expects to see deposed, with a successor picked to fill the featherweight vacancy caused by the retirement of Kid Kaplan.

At the same time Rickard definitely committed himself to a heavy-weight program in which Jack Dempsey will meet the winner of the promoter's elimination tournament to determine Gene Tunney's next opponent.

"Dempsey will return east at the end of January, and by July his opponents should have been established," Rickard wrote. "By fighting the best of the challengers he will be able to prove whether he has any chance against his conqueror."
