FARM NOTES

The favourable weather of the last two weeks has enabled the farmers to get well along with their farming operations. We understand from visitors from the mainland that the crop is much further ahead in Prince Edward Island than in the neighbouring provinces. In fact, some of our farmers have already finished seeding. The clover and grass meadows appear to have wintered over very well and are looking very prosperous at the present time. A good crop of grass hay is expected from the operations as supplying plenty of feed for our dairy herds but should the season be a dry one later on, farmers will be well advised if they will sow for green fodder during

the summer, a liberal supply of mixed grain, a mixture of Vetches, Field Peas and Oats, at the rate of about three bushels to the acre will produce an abundant crop of rich milk producing feed to help out dry pastures during the summer months. Fodder Corn also should be grown to a larger extent than it is at the present time as this valuable fodder crop will mean many extra dollars in the pockets of the farmers with dairy herds. With both butter and cheese selling at a higher price at the present time than a year ago and with prospects of still higher prices, the farmer who is alive to the dairy interests will see to it that he has plenty of milk producing fodder for the summer months.

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, May 22.—"Eggs"—Ontario cars of extras are being offered at 33 and firsts 31 F. O. B. shipping point. Freight charges on these amount to about 1c per dozen to Toronto. Western carlots are offering extras 31.4, firsts 29.14, seconds 25 F. O. B. shipping point. Markets generally continue firm and unchanged. Toronto jobbing extras 35, firsts 33, seconds 30, Winnipeg jobbing extras 29, firsts 27, seconds 25. Calgary Receipts light, dealers paying delivered extras 32, firsts 30, extras jobbing 34, firsts 32, seconds 29.

MONTREAL, May 22.—The export trade in Canadian grain in the Montreal market today was reported very quiet owing to the fact that there were few firm bids in the market from foreign buyers that could be accepted. The demand for ocean grain was also better and especially so from United States exporters and a moderate amount of business was transacted to most parts at steady rates. A feature of the local cash grain market was the enquiry from New York exporters for No. 2 Canadian western on the spot at sixteen cents per bushel over the Winnipeg job option. C. I. F. here but as there were none offering, no sales were made. The trade in oats was quiet but the tone was firm and prices were unchanged. The spring flour market was without any new features to note, prices being steady and the volume of business small. The winter wheat flour situation was quiet with no change in prices. Prices were maintained for all lines of millfeed but the trade volume was not large, extreme dullness marked the trade in rolled oats. A fairly active business was done on eggs in a wholesale jobbing way and values were unchanged. Although the undertone to the butter market was easier, there was no change in prices, but this is expected shortly. Little business was transacted in cheese and the tendency was unchanged.

DEMPSEY WEL-COMED TO PARIS

PARIS, May 21.—A pitched battle between a crowd of 3,000 admirers of Jack Dempsey and Paris police greeted the heavyweight fighter yesterday afternoon when he arrived in Paris with his bride. This disturbance followed one even more disconcerting to Dempsey, a rough passage of the English Channel, that resulted in the champion taking the count from sea-sickness. A salvo of broken window panes at the railway station was the salute the Dempseys received, when the police, anxious to keep a passage clear, closed two of the three exit doors from the platform. A crowd attempted to force its way in, and a whole platoon of police was needed to maintain order. Several were injured and more handled by the police, but, thanks to Georges Carpentier's elbow work and swift deft interpreting, the Dempseys managed to escape unscathed to a waiting automobile.
