..THE STELLA MARIS.—The case of the Schooner "Stella Maris" before Capt. Demers Wreck Commissioner for Canada was concluded at Summerside on Saturday evening. The Witnesses examined were Capt. Cameron, Alfred Paquet Chief Officer, John McDonald, 2nd. Officer and Chief Engineer Chas. Cummings all of the Steamer Northumberland and Capt. Gallant owner of the Schooner Stella Maris and his mate and Capt. Perry of the Schooner "Wild Briar" and his mate. It was contended by the Capt. of the "Stella Maris" that the Northumberland carried the small schooner which was only twenty tons burthen into ice which was too heavy for her which caused the schooner such damage that she sank in twenty minutes after the Northumberland let go her lines and that this might have been avoided had the Northumberland let go her tow before reaching this heavier ice and allowed the Schooner to work her way to the wharf or had the Northumberland gone into the ice and let the schooner go into a lead of open water, which the Captain contended was to Starboard of the steamer. Capt. Cameron and his officers stated that they had taken the schooner in tow as it was seen she could not get into Point Du Chene owing to the lolly and ice and that they had used due diligence vigilance and skill in bringing their tow into port and had rendered all necessary assistance and that they were in no way responsible for the sinking of the vessel. At the close of the evidence A. C. Saunders on behalf of the owners of the Schooner addressed the Court after which Capt. Demers announced that he would give judgment two weeks hence in Ottawa and the Court adjourned.—H.
