Call Synod To Elect Bishop MONTREAL, Feb. 22 (CP)—(AP)—A general meeting of the Synod of the Montreal diocese was called today for March 7 for the election of an Anglican Bishop to succeed Rt. Rev. John Farthing, who resigned last month. About 125 clergymen and 350 lay delegates from all parts of the diocese, which roughly takes in the eastern half of Quebec province, was expected to attend. The meeting will be held in Christ Church Cathedral here. Rev. Arthur Carlisle, Dean of Montreal, has been administering the diocese since Bishop's Farthing's resignation.
