Dodgers See League Lead Cut Down To Three Games As Chicago Cubs Win 11-8

With their pitchers unable to stop the Chicago sluggers, Brooklyn Dodgers saw their National League lead cut to three games yesterday as they dropped an 11-8 decision to the Cubs while the second place Cardinals were whipping the Athletics.

Leroy Fland, the Dodgers' starting hurler, was bludgeoned in the sixth when the Cubs bunched five of their 15 hits for five runs. Claude Passeau was touched for four runs in the fourth to send the Dodgers out in front and finally was knocked from the mound in the seventh but he received credit for his eighth victory — the last seven in a row.

Blue Points Buy Less Than One-Tenth of Diet Need

Under the O. P. A. allowance of 50 blue points per person each month, less than one-tenth the fruits and vegetables which U. S. department of agriculture experts deem necessary for a minimum low income diet, can be obtained from commercial canned goods.

Blue Points Buy Under 10% of Diet Needs

Of 11,700 calories which a family of five requires as a daily minimum, department of agriculture experts say a minimum of 1400 to 1540 should come from fruits and vegetables. But blue point allowance, less than 10 points a day, will not buy one-tenth this calorie quota in canned fruits and vegetables.

Blue Points Buy Under 10% of Diet Needs

A family of five, including two moderately active adults and three children of 2, 8 and 14 years respectively, requires for an adequate diet 11,700 calories a day. Of these, the minimum (low income) amount which should be supplied by fruits and vegetables, on the government standard, is 1400 to 1640.

Blue Points Buy Under 10% of Diet Needs

Let's take a look at the actual amounts of vegetables and fruits their families need each week. The following are excerpts from charts in "Rosa's Foundation of Nutrition," modern 4th edition, by MacLeod and Taylor.

Figuring from this authority, the food needs for a family of four would be about 8 lbs. of tomatoes and citrus fruits, 13 1/2 lbs. leafy green and yellow vegetables, and 16 lbs. of other vegetables and fruits, per week. The family's blue points will buy only a small fraction of this.

The U. S. department of agriculture has determined nutritive requirements on an income basis, finding that for the low income group 12 to 14 per cent of total calories should be in fruits and vegetables; for medium incomes, 14 to 17 per cent, and for high incomes, 17 to 20 per cent.
