SCRUPULOUS CARE REQUIRED TO CURE SCALP CONDITION

For treatment of the scalp that has dandruff twice weekly washing with a liquid shampoo is advisable, especially when there is much scalliness, but as the scalliness diminishes, the shampooing can be reduced to once a week or even once a fortnight. It is a common fallacy that scalliness is a sign of dryness of the scalp, and hair oils and brilliants are often recommended to remedy the imagined deficiency. This, of course is a bad practice, for it merely encourages the growth of the causal fungus. Absolutely essential is the care of combs and hair-brushes. These should be washed and disinfected at least twice weekly, otherwise no headway will be made with treatment. It is clearly hopeless to endeavor to cure the scalp infection by thorough local treatment and at the same time to constantly re-infect the scalp through infected brushes. Similarly hat-bands and linings should be cleaned or changed at regular intervals. It is also to be remembered that thorough brushing of the hair is far superior to combing. The cure of dandruff necessitates scrupulous and persistent attention to the little things.
