TORONTO, Nov. 1.—(Special)—Josephine Carr, aged fourteen, today pleaded guilty to murder and was remanded for sentence.

FATAL CHARGE IN MIMIC BATTLE

Two Troops of British Cavalry Get Mixed Up Trying to Capture the Guns

DUBLIN, Oct. 31.—There was a remarkable occurrence during the manoeuvres at the Curragh Camp, Kildare, when a squadron of the Nineteenth Hussars and Eleventh Hussars dashed into each other.

It appears that two units of the Royal Horse Artillery were engaged manoeuvring in the open plain in front of the Curragh Standhouse.

Through some error at present unexplained the Nineteenth Hussars dashed right into the open plain, and galloped right into the guns which the Eleventh Hussars were guarding.

When order was restored it was found that the occurrence was not without a fatal result.

Kaiser Must Be Looking to War

Berlin, October 28.—Recent events have apparently turned the thoughts of Emperor William more than usually toward the probability of Germany soon becoming involved in war.

His speech at Dresden yesterday and in Berlin today contained pointed references to the probability of war and the necessity of being ready for it.

At a banquet given in his honor in the Dresden schools last evening the emperor said: "If the German empire continues to prosper than we can calmly, with raised vigor and with the courage of free German men, confront any one who should venture to cross our path or to disturb us in the promotion of our reasonable interests."
