

# Toronto Maple Leafs Capture Stanley Cup

## Climax Great Comeback By Downing Gallant Wings 3-1 In Deciding Contest

TORONTO, April 19—(CP)—If you believe in numerology and such the Maple Leafs won't win the Stanley Cup again till 1952 but the future wasn't even considered today as members of the Toronto club celebrated victory that brought them the world hockey title here Saturday night.

Climaxing the most amazing comeback in playoff history, the Leafs surged from behind to down the gallant Detroit Red Wings 3-1 and gain the trophy that has evaded them since 1932. The old St. Patricks started the "win the cup for Toronto every 10 years club" in 1922.

The Wings were only 12 minutes and 13 seconds from being crowned rulers of the ice lanes when the Leafs finally smashed through. History was recorded and the Leafs became the first team to win the best-of-seven game world series after dropping the first three.

Largest crowd ever to witness a hockey game in Canada—16,218 fans remained in Maple Leaf Gardens for an hour after the battle to catch a glimpse of their heroes in street togs. The paid attendance bettered by 559 the mark established here April 19, 1938 when St. Boniface Seals met Ottawa Generals in a Memorial Cup junior championship contest.

Syd Howe scored Detroit's only goal early in the second period and the Wings nursed the lead carefully until Jimmy Orlando, badman of the playoffs, drew his second penalty of the game. Just as Jimmy stepped from the box, Dave Schriner led the count. Pete Langelle netted the winning goal two minutes later and Schriner added another.

Although they appeared to be stalling the Wings had the Leafs tied until Orlando spilled Syd Howe as the Toronto captain tried to pass him on the blains. The Leafs attacked viciously and the Wings finally faltered.

### Milkman sets New record In Marathon

BOSTON, April 19—(AP)—After being urged to compete by his wife, ailing Joe Smith, 27-year-old Medford milkman who feared he was too weak to attempt such a punishing task, today surprised even himself by winning the Boston A. A.'s famous marathon in the course record-smashing time of two hours, 26 minutes, 51 1-3 seconds.

Smith, greatly weakened by a bout with influenza in January, clipped one minute, 37 2-3 seconds off the mark set by Gerard Cole of Ste. Hyacinthe, Que. in 1940, while beating the closest of his 113 rivals, Lou Gregory, the experienced Syracuse school-master, to the tape by more than a quarter mile. Gregory was timed in 2:28 03 3-5, just 15 seconds faster than the Cole record.

The next three to finish, Carl Maroney of Medford, Don Heinicke of Baltimore, who placed third twice and second in the last three B. A.
