COAL NATURAL RESERVOIR OF EMERGENCY FUEL OIL

QUEBEC, Que., Sept. 10.—It is certain that we must look upon coal, and particularly coal of inferior value and sortings, as the national reservoir of fuel oil in case of emergency, even if it cannot profitably furnish this commodity in normal times, was the statement made by Alfred W. Nash, of London, England, in a paper on "Possible Auxiliary Sources of Liquid Fuel."

Attempts to devise commercial processes for the extraction of motor spirit, fuel and other oils, from low-grade coal have met with a considerable measure of success in recent years. The two best-known methods are by low-temperature carbonization, and by the process named, after its inventor, the Bergius process. In the former, a gas is obtained which, on cracking, yields motor spirit and other oils. The Bergius process consists essentially of the action of hydrogen, under pressure of 150 to 200 atmospheres, on coal at temperatures of 450 to 482 degrees centigrade. The yield from one ton of coal is stated to be as follows: 525 kilograms of oil, which can be reserved into 150 kgm. of refined motor spirit, 200 kgm. of Diesel oil, with the balance in lubricating and fuel oils; 210 kgm. of gas; 5 kgm. of ammonia; and 240 kgm. of coke.

The commercial success of such processes must of course depend on the price of well oil, but as this may be expected to advance with dwindling supplies, the general introduction of coal as a source of oils of all kinds can, it would be believed, be only a question of time. In Western Canada we have enormous reserves of low-grade coal which should be amenable to treatment.

Mr. Nash also made extended reference to the vast deposits of bituminous sand along the Athabaska river, which also can be treated to yield liquid fuels, though not profitably at present prices. They, however, must be counted as a resource of immense potential value.

MOUNTED POLICE PATROL SHIP

An auxiliary schooner, 95 feet long, is being built for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for patrol work in the western Arctic. This ship will also facilitate the changing of personnel in, and the transport of supplies to, the police detachments along the Arctic coast of Canada from Herschel Island eastward to Coronation Gulf.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND DAY AT THE CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION

Although Prince Edward Island had no booth of exhibits in the Women's Building at the Canadian National Exhibition, in the section devoted to the exhibits of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, "The Island" was there very much in the spirit. This was due chiefly to Mrs. Ewen MacDonald, better known as L. M. Montgomery, whose many delightful wholesome stories of "Anne of Green Gables" with their P. E. I. setting, have made both her and her province famous.

On Prince Edward Island Day, the Ontario Government gave a luncheon in honor of the Women's Institutes of this province. The guests of honor included Mrs. MacDonald, Miss Mabel Burnham, of the Dominion Department of Immigration; Mrs. F. D. Warren, head of the Girl Guides for Canada; Dr. Craig, heading a delegation from Peterborough, that is putting on a Made-in-Canada exhibition, and that had come to the Women's Building for ideas; Mrs. Alfred Watt, M.B.E., the Canadian woman who took the Women's Institute idea to England in 1915; Mrs. David Watt, Birtle, Man., honorary president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada; Mrs. C. Field Robertson, president Ontario Federation; Mrs. C. Macoun, Campbell; Mrs. J. Oliver and Miss G. Oliver of the C. N. E. Women's Committee; and representatives of the other provinces in charge of W. I. booths.

Proud of The Island.

The scheduled speakers were Mrs. MacDonald, Miss Mabel Burnham, and Dr. Craig.

"I am always glad to represent my own dear Island," said Mrs. MacDonald. "No matter where I go, I am so proud to claim its distinction. There is a certain quality of the loveliness in the brilliant color of its beauty, a certain austerity about it that I miss in my Ontario home. I am glad to be represented in the great sisterhood of provinces," she concluded, "for we are all working for the common good of our own nation and the glory of our Empire."

Mrs. MacDonald spoke again in the afternoon, and her name drew a very large crowd of interested listeners. Instead of making a speech, she declared one that would tell them things they already knew, or give them advice they would not take—she told most charmingly a true story of the "Wreck of the Mar-co Polo", a story of the north shore of P. E. Island. It was a tale of the sea—of the heroic rescue of some thirty men who were caught in a storm in the hull of this schooner, which they were dismantling. It was told in the well-known entertaining L. M. Montgomery style.

Miss Burnham, in her brief talk at the luncheon, stated that a number of families were settling in P. E. Island, under the Empire Settlement scheme. She expressed her appreciation of the work of the Women's Institutes, in welcoming these new settlers in every community where W. I.'s existed. One and all wrote of the splendid encouragement and assistance they received in getting settled in a new land. She touched on a few problems such as the placing of English girls with a small amount of capital into districts with assured markets for poultry and small fruits. So far only two provinces had offered any encouragement to these Nova Scotia with its Annapolis Valley, and Ontario with the County of Norfolk.

In Canada for the year ending March 31st, 1923, the records of establishments under inspection show there were 17,682 carcasses condemned, and 1,592,382 portions of carcasses condemned for all causes. Of these 51.60% of the cattle carcasses were condemned on account of Tuberculosis and 17.94% of portions of carcasses of cattle for Tuberculosis.

Of the Swine 74.29% were condemned owing to Tuberculosis and 83.21% of portions of swine were condemned for Tuberculosis.

This shows that about 500 carloads of live stock were wasted, as the carcasses of these animals, owing to Tuberculosis Infection were only fit for fertilizing purposes. It also indicates that over 200 carloads of feed were wasted, which had been used to bring these animals to the highest state of perfection for slaughter.
