TO TAKE A REST.—Rev. H. Pierce, L.A., of Portland Church, St. John, a native of Highfield, P. E. I., has intimated to the officials that he will take a year's rest, on account of finding the work there a heavy tax on his strength.

SPLENDID LECTURE.—Rev. E. S. Weeks of Pownal delivered his lecture on Naples and Rome in the Fredericton Hall on Wednesday evening. The good attention that was given for two hours indicated a lively interest in what was being said.

THE DETECTIVES.—It is understood that Messrs. Elrod and Valade, the detectives who were to have given evidence for the prosecution in the prohibition cases at the City Police Court on Thursday, returned from Summerside on Wednesday afternoon and went to one of the hotels (in which they had been staying for a while) and, having had their supper, settled their bills and left by the night train for Georgetown. It seems therefore, that it was their intention to abandon the cases in which they were concerned.

A NEW PRESIDENT.—W. D. Sumner who has been for the last fifteen years practicing law in the State of Missouri and spending his summer vacations with his mother in Tignish has on the first of the year disposed of his law practise out west and taken up his permanent residence in Tignish where he intends in the future to make it his headquarters for the handling of his holdings in several of the largest gas companies on the island besides going extensively into farming and stock raising. Although an American by adoption, Mr. Sumner was born in this province and although yet a young man he is one of the largest land owners in West Prince.

OATS INSPECTED.—Mr. W. Davidson, instructor in field husbandry, returned this afternoon from Summerside where he had been inspecting oats for the Banner Out Club. He went over about a thousand bushels and found it nearly all to be up to the standard. About six per cent were turned down on account of colour and about twenty had to be refilled because of the presence of a large percentage of small oats. The quality on the whole, he stated, was good although the natural tendency at present is for them to be somewhat darker than is usually the case, owing undoubtedly to the weather. The Banner Out Club is marketing about twenty thousand bushels of oats this year, all of which was inspected in the field and will be inspected in the bag again before being shipped.
