Censor Bonfires In South Africa

CAPE TOWN, May 8 (CP) - Customs authorities in Cape Town have been busy making bonfires of hundreds of books and imported periodicals among 176 publications which have been banned in South Africa under new stringent censorship regulations.

It seems that a good deal of light reading which is sold everywhere in the world will be unavailable in South Africa, a leading Cape Town bookseller said in an interview.

As well as the formidable list already compiled, the censor board has empowered the censor to stop any other periodicals entering the country that in the written matter cases it is responsible for the action taken in the advertisements and cover illustrations.

Lord Astor Makes Strong Statement

LONDON, May 8 (CP-Havas) - Viscount and Lady Astor are no more Fascist than they were Communist several years ago when they visited Russia. Lord Astor declared in a statement issued last night.

The story that a group meets at Cliveden for weekends and not only intrigues in the interests of Fascism but is able to force its view on the cabinet originated in the imagination of the editor of a "red" publication, he said.

Lord Astor took advantage of the occasion to deliver a slashing attack against Communism in general, which is bitterly opposed by the said, to good British relations with Germany or Italy.

"Imaginary accounts of the Cliveden Set," he continued, "have also appeared in the Communist organ Daily Worker. In March it was stated that late in January a weekend party took place at Cliveden among the guests were, in addition to the Astors, Lord Lothian, and the pamphlet intimated that decisions were taken at this January party which led up to certain events in February and March.

"What are the facts? In January our House was cited, Lord Lothian was in India and Lady Astor and I were in the United States, from which I returned in March. The 'fateful weekend party' in January never took place at all...."

At the age of 18 she started work on a Kansas newspaper, and later became news editor of the "Japan Times," said in an interview.

When she first wanted to cover the water front in Kobe for a Japanese newspaper she was told to find a place for a lady, "I'm not a lady," she told them, "I'm a newspaperwoman."

Of the countries she had visited she especially likes New Zealand because "it's about 25 years behind the times—that's what makes it so attractive. It's very restful."

Her most peculiar job was as correspondent for the Japanese Times. She sat in a small hut with one deep in mud in company with one Japanese and one Russian.
