**NARROW ESCAPE OF ISLAND MAN.**

WAKEFIELD, Rhode Island, July 19.—The almost miraculous restoration to life of Robert Mooney, at the recent boat races, is the theme of much comment. Mooney is said to have been under the water for from 15 to 20 minutes. It appears he went out in a boat to watch the races.

His boat was caught in a squall and overturned. Mooney was caught under the sail and could not get out. It was twenty-three minutes before he was taken from the water and then his rescuers began the rolling process. They expelled about a gallon of water from the lungs. Artificial respiration was begun at once.

The patient was as purple as a grape Supt. Knowles, Supt. of the Life Saving Corps spread a small motor cover of canvas and removed the body to it, keeping up at the same time the bellows movement and friction by rubbing the limbs. A fire was built and stones were heated, which in the course of thirty minutes were rolled in jackets (and applied to the armpits, heart, and soles of the feet). The bellows movement was kept up while others worked at the arm movement.

The first sign of life was observed after the life savers had worked on the patient for an hour and twenty minutes, says the report. This was noticed when a hot stone was placed against the soles of the patient's bare feet. The constant rubbing and artificial respiration, with renewed applications of hot stones, showed marked development of the condition of the patient. About twenty-five minutes later a physician arrived and reported that there was an action of the heart and pulse. The patient was then taken in the launch to the boathouse, some distance away. All the time the bellows movement and rubbing were kept up. This had been going on for one hour and forty-eight minutes. The patient remained unconscious all the time. After arriving at the boathouse the patient was worked with for some time and later taken to his home, where he regained consciousness.

The Robert Mooney referred to is well known in Charlottetown. His mother and sisters live on Kent Street between Queen and Pownall.

THIRD QUARTER.

WORDS AND WORKS OF JESUS AS RECORDED IN THE GOSPELS.

LESSON V.—JULY 20.

JESUS DINES WITH A PHARISEE.

Luke 14. 1-14. Memorize verses 13, 14.

**GOLDEN TEXT.**

He that humbly himself shall be exalted.—Luke 14. 11.

Time.—Winter, A. D. 28-30.

Place.—Perea, "beyond Jordan."

**INTRODUCTION.**

Jesus was no ascetic. He mingled freely with men of every class. At Jericho he entered the home of Zacchaeus the publican, until then an extortioner and thief; more than once he dined with the hypocritical Pharisees in their own home; at Jacob's well, in the house of Simon, and on other occasions he spoke kindly to the outcast and the sinful. He always admitted into his presence the poor, the diseased, and the socially ostracized. Yet he never compromised his own position, his lofty purpose, or his spotless purity in doing as he did. Everywhere he was the same fearless opponent of shame and hypocrisy, the same sympathetic friend of the needy and of the penitent, the same courageous teacher of righteousness by word and example. The quest of a self-righteous Pharisee and a hypocrite, the dictum of a false etiquette did not seal his lips. Courageously but fearlessly he reproves even his host, pointing out to him the shallowness of his own religious life. Thus was his life ever a life in the world but not of the world, and like him we, too, should live unpolluted from the world, in which it is God's plan that we for a time should live and labor.

**EXPLANATION.**

1. "The house of one of the chief Pharisees"—A Pharisee of high rank and social standing. A similar visit to the home of the Pharisees is recorded in Luke Co.

11. 35. ff., on which occasion Jesus uttered his terrible arraignment of the Pharisees as a class, whose hostility against him by this time had become acute. This invitation to this second dinner can therefore not have been sincere, as the sequel of the story shows. It was evidently a plot to, if possible, entangle him in his speech, for we read that "they watched him."

2. "A certain man before him"—Doubtless placed there purposely by the host and his friends. "The dropsy"—This is the only mention in the New Testament of this disease, which was unsightly and considered incurable.

3. "Answering"—Responding to the evident expectation that he would take some note of the sick man. "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day?"—Jesus foresees the encounter, and himself takes the initiative to bring it about.

1. "Took him"—Literally, "took hold of him," that is, touched him for the purpose of effecting the cure.

2. "An ass or an ox"—Literally, according to the best manuscripts, "a son or an ox," which may be taken in the sense of "a son-in-law, even an ox."

3. "That his argument was conclusive seen to have had no influence on the convictions of these prejudiced and superstitious religious leaders."

12. Then said he also to him that bade him, Call not any friends, or brethren, or kindred, or neighbors.—Not to be taken literally except in cases where this feasting with friends of rank and wealth stifles the spirit of hospitality toward the lowly and needy which Jesus would here inculcate.

13. "Call the poor"—Eat the fat, and drink the sweet, and send portions unto them for whom nothing is prepared" (Neh. 8. 10; comp. also Matt. 23. 35).

**QUESTIONS ON THE LESSON.**

Who were the Pharisees? What were their teachings? What may be said in their favor? What to their discredit? If they were the vowed enemies of Jesus why did he consent to dine in the house of a Pharisee? In what sense was Jesus, and in what sense was he not, a respecter of persons? In what respects is the conduct of Jesus in the home of this Pharisee to be an example to us?
