MR. REX RABBIT WILL LOOK LIKE MINK OR CHINCHILLA

High quality and durable fur coats, comparing with chinchilla and mink in everything but price, will shortly be within the reach of every woman. They will be British-grown furs of rabbit. A coat will cost about \$80.

By breeding the Rex Rabbit for the past 10 years Mr. W. King Wilson of the Harper, Seamus Agricultural College, Shropshire, has achieved results that are startling furriers all over the world. At this season's autumn dress shows Rex-furred wraps, collars, and trimmings in a variety of beautiful colors were on parade, and your fur coat, madam, should be on the market by next year.

The romantic story of the Rex Rabbit begins in 1919, when a French abbot, M. L'Abbe Gillet caught a wild rabbit which had no "guard-hairs."

Guard-hairs in the ordinary rabbit become loose and shabby when made into a fur coat.

The abbot set to work, produced a new breed of rabbit—all minus their guard-hairs. The Rex Rabbit had arrived.

Next Mr. Wilson experimented in coloring the Rex Rabbit. He has now obtained eight different colors, among them lilac, chinchilla, black, cinnamon, blue, and chocolate.
