She was connected with one of the hospitals in France for sometime and later joined the Canadian A. M. C. She was in service during some of the biggest battles of the war and needless to say had a memorable experience in ministering to the sick and suffering soldiers. Another Island Nursing Sister Viola Beers arrived home recently. She was for some time on the staff of the Canadian Officers Convalescent Hospital at Mallock Baths, Derbyshire. She went overseas with the 1st Harvard Unit in June 1915 and transferred to the Canadians a little later.

AUTO NON-GLARE LENSES.—The attention of auto owners is called to the Regulation under "The Motor Vehicle Law" of this Province recently passed by the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, requiring non-glare lenses to be used on auto lamps. The Regulation is as follows:—"No auto lamp shall be used or displayed on any motor vehicle while being driven in this Province unless such lamps are protected by proper non-glare lenses, approved by the Provincial Secretary; and no motor vehicle shall be registered or operated in this Province without being so equipped." "Non compliance with this Regulation shall be deemed an offence against "The Motor Vehicle Law" and the Regulations thereunder, and shall render the offender liable, if he be the owner of the car, to cancellation of his car permit, and if he be the driver thereof, only to cancellation of his license as operator or chauffeur, or, in either case, to a fine of ten dollars for each and every offence, or to both cancellation of permit or license and fine." As motor vehicles already registered must be registered again on or before the 1st May, 1919, these lenses should be procured in due-time. 4966-4-9MwithMay19

ISLAND PREACHER IN NEW GLASGOW, N.S.

(New Glasgow News, 14th.) Yesterday was anniversary day in his church of which Rev. E.H. Ramsay is pastor. The preacher on this occasion was the Rev. John Pringle, D.D., pastor of St. Andrews Church, Sydney, C.B., but who has been overseas during the last four years as chaplain in one of our Battalions. It is only recently he returned. Some years ago, Dr. Pringle was a missionary in Yukon, and did good work in that far north-western region. Like Mr. Ramsay, he is a native of P.E.I. but this is the first time he has addressed a New Glasgow congregation. He has been forty-one years in the ministry, but in spite of his trying experiences in the past, his natural force is by no means abated, and his determination to continue to preach the Word and to labor for the salvation of men is as strong as ever.

In his introductory remarks yesterday morning, he said he had now returned to his former field of labor and was going to settle down to pastoral work again. There were two things he was going to do: one was to visit every family under his charge, and endeavor to build the family altar in every home. Another was to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, fully, freely, and faithfully. There is a great demand in Canada now by some people about the need of Reconstruction and Readjustment. No doubt what they say, some of them at least, may be true and necessary. But one fact remains, in spite of all that can be said and done, that what we need now in Canada above everything else, is the simple gospel of Jesus Christ, that can alone give us life, that alone can quicken and regenerate, and that alone can uplift and save. That first of all; and then all the good things that will come through reconstruction and adjustment will naturally follow.
