N. Y. Stock Prices Advanced Saturday

NEW YORK, May 4—(AP)—Despite considerable irregularity, the stock market Saturday stepped out of its best recovery week since mid-March with a modest average gain although dealings and breadth were the smallest since 1944. Transfers of 250,000 shares were a low since July 29, 1944, and compared with 290,000 in the previous short stretch. The week's aggregate was 4,328,320 shares against 4,379,670 the week before and was a bottom since the period of March 22. On the day Chrysler extended its Friday bulge by 1 5/8 at 102 3/8. Norfolk and Western was up 1/4 at 231 and Johns-Manville 3 1/4 at 118 1/2. Modest improvement was shown for General Motors, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, American Telephone, Standard Oil (N.J.) following oversubscription of a big secondary offering. Burlington Mills, U. S. Lines, Montgomery Ward, United Aircraft, Anaconda, Kennecott, Du Pont and General Electric. Sharp and Dohme yielded 2 5/8 at 22 7/8 on a drop in net and American Airlines, 1 3/4 at 10 1/4 in the wake of income loss in the first quarter. American Chicle dipped 1/2 at 146 and Dow Chemical 1 1/2 at 156 1/4. On the offside were Great Northern Railway, Schenley, American Can, Republic Steel, Goodyear, Glenn Martin, Public Service of N. J. and Union Carbide. Canadian Pacific gained 1 3/8 among otherwise quiet Canadian issues. Dome Mines, McIntyre and Distillers Seagram were unchanged. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .1 of a point at 63, its fourth successive advance. The week's gain was 1.4 points, widest since the period concluded March 22.

Prices Are New Trouble To U. S. Steel Industry

CLEVELAND, May 4—(AP)—With the wage question apparently settled, major attention now centres on a likely steel industry price policy, the magazine Steel reported today. Although steel company profits were high in the first quarter, reports of 13 producers indicating an aggregate increase of about 22 per cent over the fourth quarter of last year, early industry-wide reduction in base prices on steel products appears unlikely, the trade journal reported. Expectations are that the wage increase, which alone adds about \$3.25 per ton in direct labor cost, coupled with expected advances in raw materials, will preclude any substantial price reduction. Delays in reaching agreements between the Union and several important steel producing interests last week caused shutdown of some plants. ATTENTION POTATO PRODUCERS The attention of potato producers is directed to the following Act passed at the recent session of the Provincial Legislature. Producers are urged to arrange immediately for necessary seed supplies that will conform to the provisions as outlined in this Act. BE IT ENACTED by the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island as follows: 1. This Act may be cited as the "Prince Edward Island Potato Act." 2. From and after the passing of this Act, no person shall plant potatoes in the Province of Prince Edward Island unless the seed is of the class Foundation, Foundation "A", or Certified, as determined by the official inspections carried out by the Plant Protection Division, Science Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to potato crops which, in the aggregate, on an individual property, do not exceed one acre, unless by proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council otherwise. 3. All potato crops as covered by Section 2 hereof shall be subject to inspection as follows: (a) Subject to conformity with the regulations governing the production of certified seed potatoes, crops planted with Foundation or Foundation "A" seed with a view to seed certification, may be inspected by the Plant Protection Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture. (b) Potato Crops including those planted with seed of the "Certified" class with a view to table stock production shall be inspected for bacterial ring rot, or any other disease or insect pest as may be determined from time to time, by duly authorized inspectors of the Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture. 4. Each potato grower, as covered by Section 2 hereof, shall be required to register each field of potatoes for inspection as follows: (a) If for seed potato production, applications shall be submitted to the District Seed Potato Inspector, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown. (b) If for table stock, production, application shall be submitted to the Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture. 5. In accordance with the Certified Seed Potato Regulations each grower who applies for inspection of his crop for seed purposes shall be required, among other qualifications, to supply proof of the planting of seed of the Foundation or Foundation "A" class in the field for which inspection is requested. All other growers shall be required to supply proof of the purchase or certified seed used for planting the potato crop. 6. Each grower shall exercise the necessary care in the planting, cultivation, spraying, dusting or harvesting of his potato crop to avoid any possible contamination with bacterial ring rot through machinery, harvesting containers, storage or second hand bags. 7. Failure to comply with any of these regulations shall result upon summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$100 or in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding thirty days or both.
