LESLIE JENKINS WEDDING

(From the Sellersville, Pa., Herald, Sept. 8th)

Stately old Trinity, America's best known Protestant Episcopal Church, made a most fitting background for the simple but beautiful wedding of Miss Helen Leslie Jenkins with George Robertson Leslie on Saturday afternoon at four o'clock.

Even though performed in New York City, the ceremony will be of great interest to a large circle of friends here, and, in fact, the South where the bride and her family are well known. Her parents, Mr and Mrs. A. M. Jenkins, now of Oceanside, Long Island, formerly owned and occupied an attractive farm summer home on "The Trail" in the Key-Stone Point section, of Sellersville and her eldest sister, Hilda, was married to J. Buel Tiffany, in St. Paul's Reformed Church, Sellersville, by Rev. W. P. Kosman, the pastor in 1910.

The dignified ring wedding service of the Episcopal Church was read by the Rev. Dr. Frederic W. Goodman, assistant rector of Trinity and the bride was given in marriage by her father, upon whose arm she came down the aisle. The attendants of the bride and groom were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Buse, of New York, Conn., who stopped in New York for the wedding on the way to their summer home on Lake George, Mrs. Buse, as Miss Mabelle Shuter, was a chum of Miss Jenkins at the Phelps' School, Wallingford, Conn., from which they graduated in 1917.

An interesting fact regarding Dr. Goodman came out during the informal reception held in his study at the church after the ceremony, when upon "comparing notes" it was discovered that he was rector of one of the leading churches in Chattanooga, Tenn., at the time of the bride's birth, which occurred in the southern city, and had known her parents here. Dr. Goodman is an extremely busy man and had performed two other wedding ceremonies Saturday afternoon preceding this.

The bride wore a simple but exquisite gown of imported midnight blue Georgette, hand embroidered with blue and bronze beads. Her hat was of jet and she carried a bunch of pink gladioli, pink and white snap dragons and purple and white asters. No daintier, lovelier bride ever knelt before the altar. Five covered altar of Trinity in many years, it is safe to say. The bride's travelling costume was of midnight blue velveteen.

Immediately after the informal reception at the church, the happy couple were driven to their suite at Hotel Commodore, from which they left early Sunday morning for Montreal, Quebec, Moncton, Halifax and other Canadian cities and places of interest. They will be at home on the old Leslie estate after October first. This is located on Grindstone the largest of the Magdalen Island group near the middle of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

REPORT OF RED CROSS

REPORT OF THE RED CROSS PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE FOR SIX MONTHS, MARCH 1ST, TO AUGUST 31ST, 1921

I beg to submit the report of the Red Cross Public Health Nursing Service for the six months ending August 31st, 1921.

Medical inspection has been carried on in six schools on the Island and in all cases the local doctors have kindly assisted. Charlottetown, 3 schools inspected, 1096 pupils examined. Summerside, 1 school inspected, 388 pupils examined. Montague, 2 schools inspected, 151 pupils examined. Total, 1635 pupils examined. Pupils completely examined, weighed and measured 1635. Pupils with defects, 1472 or 90 per cent. Pupils without defects, 163 or 10 per cent. Pupils with defects, other than teeth, 1240 or 75 per cent. Pupils 10 per cent under weight for height, 324 or 19.8 per cent. Total number of defects, 3325

The parents were notified by slips of all defects that needed attention. In addition to the notification of the parents, 507 visitors have been made to the homes of school children in order to explain the great importance of having these defects remedied. In some cases medical attention was urgently needed, while in others special care at home was all that was necessary.

In sixteen cases in Charlottetown where the children needed to be operated on for enlarged tonsils and adenoids, or hernia and the parents were unable to pay the operating fee, satisfactory arrangements were made with the doctors and the hospitals. In every case the family doctor was called upon and on being told what home conditions we had found he has offered to do the operation or been willing that we should have the child admitted to one of the hospitals, where he would be operated on by the doctor of the hospital.

In almost every case, the parent has been able and willing to pay a small amount to the hospital in order to help defray the expenses there. The interest shown by the girls and boys in the "Health Habits" is most gratifying as shown by the numbers who come to the Red Cross Health Centre in the Market Building in order to find out if they are gaining in weight.

Until the above schools have all been revisited, it will be impossible to give any definite figures as to the defects that have been remedied, but we have every reason to believe that the majority of the advice given them with regard to their children's health.

The Red Cross Centre, Charlottetown, has received requests for advice on health matters ever since it has been open, but no report was kept till the official opening for conference on Tuesday, August 2nd.

It was decided to have a nurse in the Health Centre every Tuesday from 10 to 12 and 1 to 4 so that expectant mothers, mothers with babies and children, or children themselves could come for advice on health matters. It is to be hoped that children of pre school age will be brought in for examination before being sent to school.

During the month of August 152 visits were made to the Health Centre. The numbers were as follows: School children 63 Children of pre-school age 16 Infants 6 Expectant mothers 2 Parents of infants and children 34 Adults for advice 9 Miscellaneous, making inquiries about the work of the Red Cross 15 Emergency 1 Total 152

The babies and children were weighed and measured and in all cases, literature and advice was given. Before long, we hope that a large majority of our health centre visitors will be from the surrounding country.

We have been trying to make arrangements to have two children sent to the Blind School in Halifax, but so far have not been successful. Addresses on Child Welfare have been given thirty five meetings in different parts of the country by Dr. H. D. Johnson and at thirty five by myself. In many cases the
