GOOD TEMPLARS IN SESSION. Eminent Speakers Present. Officers Elected.

The 13th annual session of the Grand Lodge of P. E. I. assembled in Moore's Hall, E'don, at 7:30 o'clock on the 12th inst. L. U. Fowler, P. G. C. T. presided in the absence of the G. C. T. by Mr. Goldsmith.

After the appointment of Pro Tem Officers, the G. C. T. introduced ex-Judge Chase of Pennsylvania and B. D. Rogers, R. W. G. M. to the Grand Lodge and conducted them to seats on platform.

The principal work of the evening was the appointment of committees and the reading of reports.

The reports of all the officers were read and handed to a committee on distribution.

Bro. Chase on invitation spoke at some length on the Good Templar Course of Studies, and Bro. B. D. Rogers also gave some practical remarks on Good Templar work.

On receiving the report of the distribution committee the Grand Lodge adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock the following morning.

The delegates from many of the western lodges presented their credentials and received the Grand Lodge degree. The work of the morning was mostly the discussion on adoption of the different reports, all of which passed with very few amendments.

Brother S. B. Chase was granted a hearing by the Grand Lodge and spoke for nearly an hour on the educational work of the Order. His address was replete with information and useful suggestions.

All the business was conducted with great harmony and everything promises a most successful session.

At the close of the morning session a special session of the International Supreme Lodge was held with Hon. S. B. Chase presiding, and two candidates were initiated into the Supreme Lodge degree. The pro tem appointments were:

After some discussion an address was given by Rev. Mr. Price, which dealt chiefly with the preparation which the S. S. teacher needs to make.

The meeting then closed, thus ending what seemed to be a profitable convention for the S. S. Workers of South-East Prince.
