THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, July 30.—Receipts of butter yesterday were 7,092 packages, as compared with 10,121 last Friday, and 3,434 on the corresponding day last year. The market was slightly easier, although one grade brought an eighth of a cent higher price at yesterday's auction price. The open market for round lots was 1-2c to 1c lower with finest creamery quoted at 39 1-2c to 40c per lb. There was little improvement in the demand from any source. At Gould's Cold Storage 300 boxes were offered, sales taking place co-operative prices for round lots were quoted as follows: Pasteurized creamery 40c to 41c Finest creamery 39 1-2c to 40c Fine creamery 38 1-2c to 39 1-2c Receipts of cheese yesterday were 8,697 boxes, as compared with 17,296 last Friday, and 12,536 on the corresponding day last year. At Gould's Cold Storage there were 5,000 boxes offered. Sales of eastern goods were made at 22c to 24c, and of western goods at 23c per lb. Montreal delivery, an advance of 2c to 3c over Tuesday's prices. At the auction sale of Ontario goods prices ruled steady. Butter advanced 1 1-2c to 1 3-4c over Tuesday's sale prices. Some improvements is reported over the cable for supplies, and the market is generally firmer.

Auction Sale of Butter.

At the Quebec Agricultural Society sale held at the Board of Trade yesterday, there were 1,301 packages creamery butter, of which 292 packages of pasteurized creamery sold at 40 1-2c per lb.; 813 packages of finest at 39 1-2c, while 38 3-8c was bid for 196 packages of fine, the latter bid being refused.

Auction Sale of Cheese

At the United Dairymen's Co-operative auction sale of Ontario goods, held at room 806, Shaughnessy Building, yesterday, there were 1,217 boxes of cheese offered, of which 460 boxes of No. 1 white sold at 24c; 284 boxes of No. 2 white at 24c; 384 boxes of No. 1 colored at 24c, and 168 boxes of No. 2 colored at 23c.

Country Cheese Boards.

IROQUOIS, Ont., July 29.—At today's session of the Cheese Board, 755 boxes were boarded, 575 colored and 180 white. The usual buyers were present. The bid started at 23c, and raised to 24c. No sales on board, but all sold on curb at 24c. At the same date last year 840 boxes were boarded and the price 25 1-2c.

"Three Live Ghosts" is a realization of the critics' most ambitious dream in the line of comedy. It is the most delightful Summer piece that has been given here in years.

Last night's performance had a splendid audience, and every laugh of the play thrilled the entire house.

Taking the play itself, written by Frederick S. Isham, the plot, though simple in its modality, is built up with details which are very cleverly worked into the substance of the comedy. The production is almost Shakespearean in its triumph of character delineation.

The bulk of the acting falls on Mrs. Gubbins, "Old Sweetheart," also, and the bulk of the talking. This star part is taken by Miss Ruby Hallier. To say she is excellent in the part would be fair praise. Eleanor Masters as Rose Gordon is the dark sweetheart of the American, and she with the fair finance of Jimmy Gubbins make a most attractive picture both in their beauty of face and form. Lady Leicester taken by Agnes Atherton is also beautiful. The remaining parts are those of the detectives, always disliked by an audience, the better they are played the less they are liked. George Duthie and Joseph Levy shared these hard parts with Mr. Fred Bean.

LOOSENING A NUT.

Sometimes when it is desired either to tighten or remove a nut from a binder or mower it is found that it is impossible to turn it without danger of twisting off the bolt. In such a case, the nut can usually be loosened by holding an axe or heavy piece of iron against one face and striking the opposite face with a hammer. The other sides should be struck in the same way and then kerosene worked in around the nut. In working such a nut off after it has been loosened plenty of oil and patience should be used, and the nut worked back an fourth until it is finally gotten off.
