MAKING THE WORK EASIER ON IRONING DAY

Ironing with or without a laundress is a task unless the work is well systematized. If the ironing is large and the housekeeper intends doing it without a maid she should have the day's menu as simple as possible. Fruits, canned goods and cheese are good substitutes, for dishes that require special skill.

Time will be saved by dampening the clothes the night before. The pieces can also be sorted. Lay the dampened and folded starched pieces on top and the moist sheets carefully folded underneath. It is well to start with the starched pieces first.

After the fine starched garments are out of the way iron the table linen, bed linen and the smaller plain pieces next. Time will be saved and better results obtained by having a variety of irons for the different pieces. For skirts and petticoats the is a narrow iron with a sharp point that runs up the gathers.

HOW TO CURE A COLD.

Common cold in the head and its very common at this time of the year, is a communicable disease. Just what causes a cold, how to prevent it and how to cure it are subjects that a member of the faculty of the School of Medicine of the University of Missouri discusses briefly as follows:

Primarily the disease affects the sensitive lining of the nose, causing inflammation. There is no special germ that may cause one. The discharges from the nose, throat and mouth, and the exhalated cool fumes coming from a person with a cold may contain the infectious agent.

Lowered bodily resistance caused by extreme fatigue, or continued residence in poorly heated places, chilling the body, wet feet, damp clothing, pre-occupied the development of a cold. When in such conditions ordinary contact with a person who has a cold may cause one to "take" cold. Often times, overheating, causing indigestion is related to taking a cold, hence the excellent practice of taking an active purge at the beginning of a cold. A cold is usually cured in some more serious disease so it is best to block the progress of the cold.

To prevent colds, shun overheated, under heated or irregularly heated rooms and poorly ventilated rooms. Avoid personal contact with persons who have a cold. Use common sense in dressing to avoid overheating or undue exposure of the body. When colds are epidemic avoid places where large numbers of people are congregated.

But we all get colds, so the physician at the University of Missouri gives a few simple directions for the treatment of the disease. First of all, he says, keep it to yourself and protect others from infection. Use paper handkerchiefs which may be destroyed without waste. Never cough or sneeze when close to anyone. These are precautions to protect your fellows.

Within the first few hours you have a cold and upon going to bed, you may take a large hot lemonade. Spirituous liquors do not help the lemonade and should be omitted. A brisk purge should be taken at the outset. For a couple of days, eat only fruits, sweets and pastries. If there is no fever, a person may go about his ordinary activities, but it is better to remain one day at home where heating and ventilating conditions may be controlled.

Some plain bland oil sprayed in the nose is helpful, and used frequently. If the head feels "stuffed up," continued bathing of the face and hands and forehead in as hot water as can be borne is useful. If these simple measures do not control or cure the attack, you should have the advice of your physician promptly.

SEARCHING FOR BELGIUM

HALIFAX, January 15—Interesting stories of their experiences were told by Belgians who arrived at Halifax yesterday on the White Star liner Van Neste, who left Canada last November back with him from Belgium. Mr. Van Neste went to France first but was unable to reach his destination and had to return to England and go to Holland, where he was able to get through into Belgium.

He reached the village of Elesegem, where his children were staying with his mother. The place was occupied by Germans, but they did not molest the people.

Mr. Van Neste met with considerable difficulty getting back into Holland. Belgians were encouraged to return, but getting out was not allowed in case they should take up arms. By a trick Mr. Van Neste hoodwinked the German authorities and procured a passport. He produced tickets for himself and his children to Nebraska and was allowed to go. He will leave for his new home in St. Boniface, where he will resume his position as gardener at the hospital and join his wife there.

Mr. Van Neste told how British army officers spied on the Germans. He said that on a market day in Auderarde, near the coast, he witnessed a German automobile drive into the town and pull up outside the German headquarters. What appeared to be four German officers of high rank alighted and entered. They examined papers and plans and left again. The Germans were suspicious and communicated with other quarters and found that the officers were British spies. They were immediately pursued but escaped in some woods. The people supposed that the British officers escaped by aeroplane which were flying around in the vicinity. Mr. Van Neste said that British and Belgian spies were moving among the Germans, but very few were caught.

Other Belgians returning were Joe Othier and Jean Totte. The first was unfortunate. He left British Columbia to search for his family, but could find no trace of his wife and child. He landed in Ostend and then travelled to Ypres, his former home, where he remained a few days, but was driven out when the Germans arrived, leaving at one end of the town as the enemy entered at the other.

After leaving Ypres Sontaeer witnessed a skirmish between four German scouts and two Belgians and an Englishman. All but one of the Germans had been killed when one offered to surrender. In handling his rifle
