Schooner Abandoned In Mid-ocean

HALIFAX, Oct. 5 (CP)—Abandonment of the Newfoundland schooner *Hiawatha II* in mid-ocean was reported late today in a message to east coast radio from the Halifax trawler *Vernoe*.

"Crew of four safe aboard," the *Vernoe's* terse message said, but another sentence asked the Signal Service to advise Atlantic shipping the vessel was a "menace to navigation."

Rescued from the stricken vessel were Captain G. Carew of St. Mary's Nfld., his sons Victor and Wilfred, and William Pike of Carbonnear, Nfld. Advice from St. John's said the schooner had carried few supplies of food.

The four men transferred from their schooner to the 273-ton steam trawler about 100 miles due east of Canso, N. S. The *Vernoe* gave her position as 45 degrees 35 minutes north 57.55 west.

Only yesterday, an American schooner, the four-masted *Mabel A. Frye* was abandoned in sinking condition 300 miles southeast of Newfoundland and her crew transferred to the Steamship American Merchant.

Both vessels were blown off-shore by a 40-mile gale that ripped the Newfoundland coast last week. Five vessels were destroyed after being pounded against the Newfoundland and Labrador shore by wind and waves during the same storm.

Salvagers feared a sixth vessel might become a total loss. Driven shore in "the narrows" of St. John's bottle-shaped harbor Sunday, the lumber-laden schooner *Tulip* had filled with water and efforts to free her today were fruitless.

Fishing vessels returning with their catches reported a poor trip.

Attempt Made To Wreck Gull Express

KITTERY, ME., Oct. 5—Police Chief George E. Smart, said last night that John Parnham, of Portsmouth, N.H., discovered an attempt to wreck the Gull, Boston-Maritime Province express, about one mile east of this town.

Parnham, walking along the tracks 50 minutes before the Boston and Maine train was due to leave Boston for Canada, found individual ties cross the rails and a large pile of ties at Butler's Crossing, Chief Smart said.

Smart said that the ties were piled so high at Butler's Crossing that he and the railroad detectives were convinced boys could not have been responsible for what the Chief called a deliberate attempt to wreck the train.

"The Government is determined until further notice not to authorize in Paris and in the Paris region demonstrations or meetings susceptible of provoking hostile action and reaction and causing new agitation of public opinion."

Officials said this meant the Government reserved for itself the right to ban "any or all" public meetings or demonstrations at the Government's discretion.

Some followers of de la Douque charged the ban would be used solely against them.

Closing Session Of Boy's Conference At Summerside

The Sunday Afternoon Session was held in the Baptist Church at 3 P. M. The service was conducted by the Grand Praetor, Charles Taylor, Summerside. The Devotional period was led by Mr. Ralph Young, the Maritime Boys' Work Secretary, and was assisted by Robert Willet, Henry Clark, John Downing. The main address was delivered by Mr. Young.

The closing session was held in the Baptist Church after the evening service, and the church was filled to capacity with parents and those interested in Boys' Work. The service was conducted by the boys themselves in an inspiring way and left a very definite impression upon those present. Charles Taylor conducted the service; Ralph Somers, Margate read the Lesson; several boys offered prayer; Murray Willet read the minutes of the Conference and the findings of the different groups on the existing problem of Boys and their remedies. Waldron Auld, Freetown, read an address of appreciation to the entertaining Church and those who had so generously given of their hospitality to the visiting Conference.

Mr. Ralph Young then presented the address of the evening in which he stressed the need of the Churches co-operating with the M. R. E. C. in the work that they are trying to do in Boys' and Girls' Work. Mr. Young with his pleasing personality and sincere manner impressed his large audience with his challenging message.

The session was brought to a close with the impressive Fellowship Circle, and singing of the hymn, "Just As I Am." Thus was brought to an end one of the most inspiring Conferences held in this section of the Island for many years, and those who were present are looking forward to a greater interest in this important work.

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PLAN CONCENTRATED DRIVE

SEVILLE, Oct. 5 (C.P.-Havas)—Insurgent land, sea and air forces are mobilizing for a concentrated offensive to be launched against Malaga next Thursday or Friday, it was reported here tonight.

All available Insurgent warships have been concentrated at Cadiz and are being groomed for the assault against the Government Mediterranean port, according to a British source arriving here. The cruisers *Canarias*, Republic and *Almirante Cervera*, and the gunboat *Datona* are being equipped with anti-aircraft guns, he said.

Some 10,000 Insurgent troop reinforcements have been sent to Cadiz and Algeciras from Spanish Morocco within the past week, he added. Most of these reportedly were R.F.I.s.

Five armed trawlers arrived at Algeciras this morning from Ceuta, carrying 1,000 Moors.

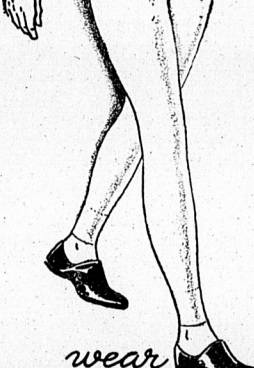
