MANCHESTER, Eng., Oct. 31—Spinners in the Lancashire cotton mills rejected a wage cut of 5 to 8 per cent today and pulled 150,000 men out on strike. Representatives of the union and the mill owners got together immediately, but they made no headway toward a compromise which might end the walkout. There were no arrangements for further meetings and up to this evening the Ministry of Labor had taken no action.

Blast Furnaces Resume Work

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 31—Smoke billowed from blast furnaces at the Sydney Steel plant yesterday as the plant resumed operations after a long period of idleness. Four hundred men will be called back to work to roll 15,000 tons of rails for the Canadian National Railways, an order sufficient to keep the plant going on single shift until January 1. Each will receive an average of three days a week. Reports have been current for the past week or so that the C.P.R. may also place an order for rails in Sydney, but there has been no official verification. In fact, company officers last week denied that they had anything on the books except the C.N.R. order.

BOND ISSUE WILL BE OVERSUBSCRIBED

Hearty Response Made By Canadian People — Three Year Loan Oversubscribed Four Times, While The Twenty Year Issue Will Almost Double The Amount Requested.

MONTREAL, Oct. 31—So hearty a response was made today by the Canadian people to a request of its government for funds that a three-year loan totalling \$25,000,000 was oversubscribed four times and unofficial estimates were made that the 20-year loan, of \$55,000,000 was well on the way to subscription.

Not until tomorrow, when full telegraphic reports are received from all over the country, will it be known just what reception the 20-year issue met with. Large switching from the short term to long term bonds was expected tomorrow to swell the total of requests for portions of the 20-year issue.

In 15 minutes, from 10 a. m. until 10.15 a. m. the loan committee received applications for \$100,000,000 of the three year issue, just \$75,000,000 more than the amount requested.

Many subscribers were expected to ask that their applications be changed to the longer issue.
