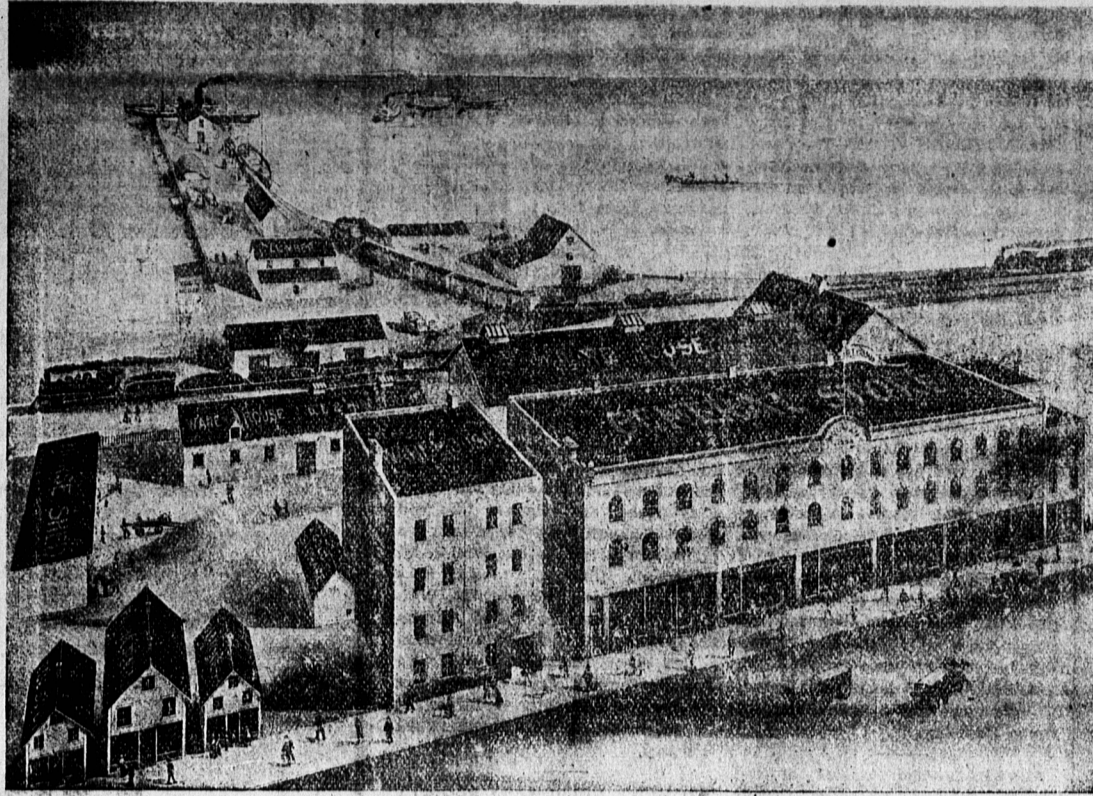

#### ROYALTY MAY VISIT UNITED STATES

It is whispered that the King will return President Wilson's visit, and make a tour of the United States. King George 5, is the first British monarch, for many generations, who

has made a tour abroad, after coming to the throne. He was the very first King to visit his overseas possessions. That journey of his to India, to be crowned as Emperor at Delhi, inaugurated a new era. King George has travelled more widely than any king who ever occupied a British throne. His tour in 1901 was an absolute record. In the great liner Ophir, which had, for the nonce, been transformed into a royal yacht, he travelled first to Ceylon, then past Sumatra to Australia. He visited Albany, Adelaide, Melbourne and Sidney. In Copsland he went shooting, and bagged forty brace of quail; at Brisbane he attended a native corroboree. Thence he proceeded to New Zealand, where the Maoric presented him

with a Hula feather, as a sign that he was a great "war chief." On the way back he called at the Cape, where he had a tremendous reception by 100,000 people. From the Cape he crossed 7,000 miles of ocean to Canada, and thence went by rail to Vancouver. By the time the royal party returned home they had travelled 25,000 miles, crossed three oceans and five seas. Our late King Edward VII. was the first to set the example of royal progresses when, in 1860, he visited Canada and laid the foundation stone of the new Parliament House at Ottawa, and drove the last rivet of the great Victoria Bridge, at Montreal. Nine years later, he visited Egypt, and in 1875 made his great progress through India where he stayed at

teen weeks, and travelled more than 10,000 miles. In 1877 he returned to India for the great Durbar at which Queen Victoria was proclaimed Empress of India. THE LATEST DEATH TEST. A remarkable new method of testing absolutely whether a dead person is really dead and thus avoiding the possibility of premature burial, just announced by Dr. Icard of Marseilles, has been received with great interest by his colleagues in Paris. Dr. Icard's system depends on the question whether the blood is still in circulation or not, and consists of a small subcutaneous injection of a small quantity of fluorescine, which is quite harmless, but one of the most violent coloring matters known.

If there be the slightest motion of the blood the fluorescine, carried around the body, stains it a vivid golden yellow, while the eyes become a deep emerald green. If on the other hand, there is no movement of the blood the coloring matter is not dispersed and produces no effect. Half an hour is stated to be enough to make this test. The laity, while duly impressed by this neat method, are asking whether persons who are alive and undergo the dying process and who later recover will lose the golden yellow tint, and the green eyes, which, as Dr. Icard describes them, "are transferred into superb emeralds, set like jewels in their sockets." It may be added, however, that fluorescine is one of the most transparent dyes known.

NATURE'S BAROMETER. One of the simplest of nature's barometers is a spider's web. When there is a prospect of wind or rain the spider shortens the filaments by which its web is sustained and leaves it in this state as long as the weather is variable. If it elongates its threads it is a sign of fine weather, the duration of which may be judged by the length to which the lengths are let out. If the spider remains inactive it is a sign of rain; if it keeps at work during rain the downpour will not last long, and will be followed by fine weather, says an exchange. Observation has taught that the spider makes changes in its web every twenty-four hours, and that if such changes are made in the evening just before sunset the night will be clear and beautiful.
