Saints Nosed Out By P. W. C. 8 to 6

Best Game of the Season Witnessed By Fair Crowd of Fans—Fast Comeback By S. D. U. in Last Half.

Playing a brand of football that nearly swept their opponents off their feet in the first half, Prince of Wales College grid stars went into the lead far enough in this half to grab the big end of the scoring from the second St. Dunstan's 8 to 6 yesterday afternoon in what culminated in one of the best exhibitions of football ever witnessed at the Abegweit grounds.

Dogged determination and hard tackling in the opening stanza was all that saved the University squad from a more severe beating, as the purple and red Collegians made onslaught after onslaught on their opponents' touch line.

The Saints were turned back eight to nothing in the first half hour of play, and during the rest period many were heard to predict that an overwhelming score would surely be piled up against them; and this was exactly the case. The Saints although playing hard and gritty football seemed to be away off in their passing and showed anything but good form in following up on the ball. Their attack in this half lacked the punch and their defence was a mere screen, especially when the opposing team was within striking distance of a touch-down. However many a prophet oversteps the mark when predicting, and such was the case in the second half of yesterday's football battle.

In the last half, Prince of Wales faced a vastly different and rejuvenated band of pigskin chasers. Getting wise to the fact, as it were, that they were not playing true to form, the red and white fifteen opened an advance on the kick-off to slowly but steadily force the play into even territory, and after six minutes of play in which they threatened on several occasions finally notched up their first score. The touch was not converted.

With the count reading 8 to 3, St. Dunstan's again took the offensive, and after six more minutes of hectic football added another score. One of the Saints dropped the ball on the take-out and forfeited a place-kick and a chance to convert.

For the remainder of the game the local college footballists were given the roughest passage they have experienced in years. They came through however, by throwing up a sturdy and well balanced defence. This supplemented with timely and well placed kicks by halves and quarters had their opponents losing valuable territory that had to be gained and regained time and again.

In ball handling and organized attack Prince of Wales had the edge yesterday. This was glaringly demonstrated in the first half of the game, and only for their combined and machine-like work in the second, the final score might have read differently.

Yesterday's game was the second of a series of three for the inter-collegiate title. The first game ended in a tie, therefore if the Saints take the next game a fourth will be necessary.

DIGESTIVE ORGANS NEED BEER AND WINE

BOSTON, MASS., Oct. 18.—Prohibition is ruining the health of the American people in the opinion of many foreign surgeons who attended the convention of the American College of Surgeons.

"Americans eat too much fats and carbohydrates, and drink so much water with them that systemic poisons are generated for the lack of alcohol to burn them up," declared Dr. Herbert Schiller of the Royal Alfred Hospital, Sydney, Australia.

"I am impressed by the difference in the looks of Australians and you Americans. Our folks look so much more healthy and vigorous. American as a nation suffer from indigestion because body poisons are not burned up by the moderate use of wines and beer.

Sir George Syme, president of the Australia College of Surgeons at Melbourne, agreed with his colleagues in deploring the fact that he noticed the healthy look of my countrymen after a visit to America."

"One of the worst features of American prohibition, it seems to me, is the disrespect for the law which is being made of it always being broken," was the comment of Dr. Farquhar MacRae of Glasgow.

"As prohibition now works in this country, I think you would be far better off with modification of that law. A moderate amount of liquor does not make a drunkard population, but rigid prohibition seems to make both drunkards and law-breakers."

WOMAN FASTS 20 DAYS

(By British United Press)

BERLIN, October 18.—A woman doctor, Margarete Freund, has fasted 20 days in the Hydropathic Institute of Berlin University so that scientific observations of the effects might be made.

During this time she allowed herself water and the juice of two lemons without sugar each day. She also continued her normal and physical work. At the end of the period she had lost 19 pounds in weight, but this loss did not occur gradually. In the first week her weight fell by 11 pounds, in the second and third by 3 and 5 pounds respectively. The weight increased quickly after her fast had ended, and in eight weeks she recovered completely.

During the fast the temperature of the body fell by a few tenths of a degree while the hands and feet were generally cold and blue. The pulse was also affected. It beat normally during repose, but the slightest physical exertion rendered it violent.

Dr. Freund reports that the first two or three days passed off well, but that on the fourth she fell ill and shivered perpetually. She had no sense of hunger then, and even thought of food with distaste. Before she started mental work she had to overcome a feeling of laziness, and she involuntarily reduced physical movements to a minimum. No physical effect was observable and bodily disturbances ceased from the twelfth day, after which Dr. Freund slept better and general feeling of weakness gradually disappeared.

On the experienced Dr. Freund declared that fasting makes a healthy body ill and intensifies what is wrong in an unhealthy body, while the organism is apparently in a condition which renders it easily susceptible to illness.
