OTTAWA, June 2.—(Eggs)—There has been no further change reported on Canadian egg markets today. It is understood that the sale of a carlot of B. C. Eggs at extras 29; firsts 27, f.o.b. Vancouver, to Montreal mentioned in this report yesterday was not confirmed. The current trading price of carlots from Vancouver is extras 30; firsts 27 1/2, f.o.b.
Toronto—The local egg situation is unchanged. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 29 to 32; firsts, 27 to 29; seconds 21 to 24.
Halifax—The egg market here is holding firm with receipts lower. Quality is showing some decline with heat and stale eggs appearing. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 30; firsts 27; seconds 20 to 21.
Montreal—The local egg market is unchanged at extras but is quiet on firsts and seconds and there is some accumulation of the two latter grades.

Presbyterian Church
In Canada

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada meets on Wednesday, the 6th inst. in the city of Regina, Saskatchewan. It will meet at eight o'clock in the evening in the First Presbyterian Church of the city. This church is a monument to the courage and strong faith of the Presbyterians of Regina. At the Disruption they lost all their churches, but nothing daunted they immediately began the erection of a new church. This is now to be the finest building in the city with a large and increasing congregation. The minister of the Assembly Church is the Rev. Lemuel Farley, one of the few students who when studying at Pine Hill remained over to the Church of his fathers. He has now come to his kingdom and his energy and enthusiasm has had its reward in the erection of this \$60,000 church. The Assembly will meet under the shadow of a great gloom. The Moderator's chair will be vacant on account of the sad passing away during his year of office, of the Rev. Leslie Clay, D.D., who was proving himself to be an ideal moderator. Who will have the honour to be his successor remains to be seen. There are several splendid men in the running, and Presbyterians throughout Canada will anxiously await the evening of June 6th. The reports to be presented to the General Assembly are all of the most encouraging nature and show a year of strenuous and glorious work. An optimism especially in the Western provinces has taken possession of the people who can confidently assert that for the development of the vast resources of these provinces the Presbyterian type of character is absolutely necessary. New churches are going up rapidly in all of these provinces, and the indications are that once again the prophesy of the great home missionary Dr. Robertson will again be realized, as far as the Presbyterian Church in Canada is concerned. On the 31st of December, 1927, the communicant membership of the church reached the grand total of 172,000, an increase of 18,000 since the Disruption of 1925. During the past year the finances have increased by \$78,000 or nineteen per cent. This is a substantial and gratifying increase for one year. A large number of applications came before the Board of Education for admission to the ministry of the church, amongst them twelve from the United Church. The Assembly at Regina promises to be a most momentous one, and will give least of grace to those who so recently only saw disaster staring them in the face. The commissioners to the Assembly from the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island are Messrs. Scott Fulton and Mr. Quincy McDowell, ministers, and A. W. Hyndman and Mr. Campbell, Hunter River, elders.

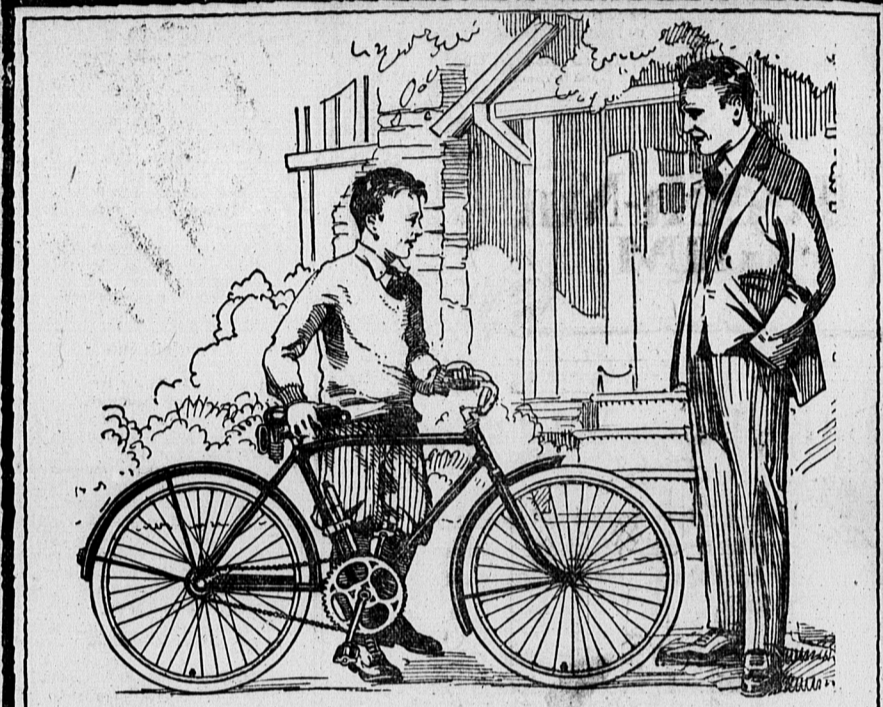

40 Percent Reduction
In Lighting Rates
For Charlottetown

As a result of a Conference Friday night between the committee of the City Council and R. C. Donaldson of New York, Vice-President of the Associated Gas and Electric Company, and Mr. T. J. Coleman, General Manager of the Maritime Electric Company, Ltd., a new schedule of rates for Charlottetown, effective July 1st, 1928, was agreed upon.
Citizens will practically get the benefit of the new rates at once. They will appear in the monthly bills rendered on July 1st.
The average reduction for domestic consumers will be about 40 per cent.
Power rates will also be adjusted and there will be an alteration in the street lighting schedule rates which will increase the illumination at less cost than under the old contract.
The present rates for domestic lighting is 15 cents per K. W. per month, less 2 cents if paid within ten days, and 25 cents per month meter rent.
The new rate will be 7 cents per K. W. hour for the first 17 K. W. Instead of meter rent there will be a service charge of 75 cents per month for the smaller residences over that. This applies to month for the smaller residences residences with 1200 square feet of floor space. For larger residences, the present commercial light rate the rate is 7 cents for the first 30 K. W. hours, and 31-2 cents per K. W. hour less 2 cents.
