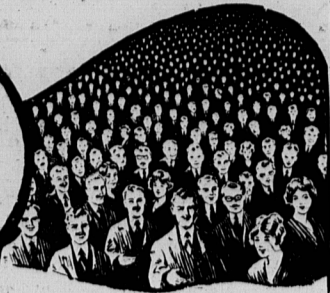

CHARLES R. DIAMOND

It is with deepest regret that we chronicle the death of Charles R. Diamond aged 65 years, which sad event occurred on January 31, 1925. He had been in failing health for some time but hopes were entertained for his recovery until complications set in which hastened his end. Mr. Diamond was a consistent member of the Baptist Church at Fairview for a number of years and was always ready to help in any good work. The church has lost a consistent worker and the community has lost a good neighbor. He has left to mourn five daughters and three sisters and three brothers, namely, his daughters Mrs. (Rev.) His wife predeceased him ten years ago.

The large concourse of the neighbors and friends that attended his funeral gave true evidence of the esteem in which he was held. Over a hundred teams followed his remains to its resting place in Fairview Cemetery. The services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Mellett, which was very impressive. His tributes to the deceased will long be remembered by those who heard it. The pall bearers were Albert J. Cudmore, John C. Cudmore, Richard Stead, James Lamplier, William Henry Neil and John Parkman.

On the evening of Friday, January 30th, Mr. Mark Pound a very highly esteemed resident of Glen Valley passed peacefully away at the age of 73 years.

Mr. Pound was a man who will be much missed not only in his home but in the church and in the whole community. He took a deep interest in every good cause. In the work of the Sunday School and the Church he was ever ready to do his share. For a number of years he taught a Sunday School in his own community. Those who sat under him in his class will not soon forget his helpful teachings and his earnest exhortations. His presence in the services of the congregation was always an inspiration. Whenever he was present there was always at least one deeply interested listener. In the earthly sanctuary henceforth there will be one more vacant seat, but in the first born in Heaven the number of the redeemed will be greater by one. But it was in the home that Mr. Pound was always at his best. His kindly genial manner and his never failing thoughtfulness for the good of others always made his presence a benediction.
