W. T. Alexander and Sons, Saint John, N.B., will have quite a formidable stable of race horses in 1934. At present they are wintering Worthy Lee 2:07 1-2, Allie Burman, 2:08 1-4, Lou Patch, 2:09 3-4 and a yearling colt by Wayne Hal.

H. T. Pulson, Upper Stewiacke, N.S., has sold the trotting mare Tease 2:08 1-4 to parties in New Richmond, Que. Tease raced better in 1933 than any year since coming to the Maritimes.

Johnny Conroy drove Darkey Gratton 2:02 1-2 in nine races this season and was five times first and four times second. He also forced Billy Strathmore to tie the track record at Fredrickton and hung up a new track record of 2:07 3-4 at Montague, P.E.I.

W. H. Cane, master of the Good Time Stable, Cochen, N.Y., and lessee of the track there, has purchased an immense garage building at Hackensack, N.J., which is but ten miles from the centre of New York City. The building is one of the finest of its kind in New Jersey and is being converted into a sports arena that will seat 6,000 people and can be utilized for all kinds of sport. Twelve hundred people can shade at one time over its ice surface.

The body of Walter H. Barrie, who at one time was quite famous as the owner of the grey pacer Pace Face 2:28 1-2, was found last week floating in the waters of Lake George, New York. No verdict as to the cause has been brought in pending an autopsy on the body.

Gaiety Gregor, 2:07 1-4, seven-year-old mare by McGregor of the Green, which was purchased for a big figure, died from pneumonia at Hartford, Conn. last week. She is a sister of Gaiety McGregor 2:07 3-4 owned in Middleton, N.S.

In looking over the Catalogue we see quite a variety of horses that we would like very much to own. Some of them did not bring very high prices. Reading the descriptions they look awfully good, but of course there may be something wrong that the description does not cover. It is a big lottery buying a horse at auction.

Charles Martens of Aarsnee, Belgium, has through W. H. Rosemore purchased the black stallion Cheer 2:03 and the good Futurity winner Spencer McElwain (3) 2:04 1-2. Both the above are good race horses and bred in the purple. After competing for a year or two in Europe they will likely be placed in the stud.

Hanover Shoe Farm is said to have one of the greatest collections of brood mares ever brought together. For instance 16 of them have records of 2:05 or faster, while three of them have records of 2:00 or faster.

Tommy Berry who trains for this farm, has marked seven of its trotters in 2:05 or better this year and three pacers in better than 2:05 and four other trotters in better than 2:10, which is proof of the quality of the offspring there as well as Tommy's ability to train a trotter or pacer.

The highest priced yearling, in fact the highest priced for any trotter or pacer at the Old Glory sale last week was the \$6,800 bid on Lawrence Hanover. He did not show the greatest amount of speed, but his breeding is superb. He is a brother to Hanover's Bertha (3) 1:58 1-2, holder of the world's record for a three-year-old filly, a sister of Charlotte Hanover (3) 1:53 1-2, joint holder of the world's record for three-year-old filly, brother to Miss Bertha Hanover (4) 2:00, world's champion four-year-old mare. He is by Peter Volo 2:02, the world's greatest living speed sire, out of Miss Bertha Dillon 2:02 1-2, herself a great race mare. Miss Bertha Dillon is the dam of seven including four in two minutes. Her dam, Miss Bertha G., (3) 2:15 1-2 is the dam

Americans are beginning to look askance at the export of their fashionably bred and good performing trotters to Europe, says the Horseman and Fair World. The export of our choicest young trotting stallions cannot do else but work severe injury to the sport of racing on one hand, in the withdrawal of its leading performers each season, but on the other hand ultimately drain our breeding ranks of those outstanding progenitors of the future which should be retained to replenish the waning ranks of aged sires upon which we now depend to furnish our leading performers.

There is a striking similarity between the exodus of trotters or the export of trotters whichever you wish to call it, and the export of Silver Black Forests from this Province, European countries, Italy, Germany, France, Belgium, Denmark, etc. have realized that the trotting bred horses has a war utility as well, hence the encouragement of breeding of trotters in those countries.
