Mr. Hazzard, M. P., made his maiden speech on Wednesday evening on the tariff, a subject on which he is well qualified to speak, and an Ottawa despatch tells that he made a capital impression. The budget debate is now over, the Government majority on the final division being 58.

The [Chicago Tribune contrasts the character of the immigration coming to the United States and Canada respectively. Last year of the 930,830 who reached the States over two thirds came from eastern and southern Europe. Eighty per cent of the 128,000 who came to Canada were from the British Isles, United States, Germany, France, Belgium and Scandinavia. "most of them able-bodied young men and women." The Tribune adds that Sir Richard Cartwright is justified in exulting.

Thirty years ago there were no telephones; now there are 2,315,000 telephones in use in the United States alone. There are 65,000 wage earners and 15,000 salaried officials employed, making 80,000 who are paid a total sum of \$36,000,000 yearly. Behind these are the factories that make the phones, the 4,300,000 miles of wire and other supplies. Last year there were over five billion telephone talks in the United States. These figures give some idea of the business that has grown out of one modern invention.

The Toronto News, one of the leading independent newspapers of Canada, and fast becoming a power in the land, forcibly calls attention to the question of national defence. There are only 40,000 rifles in the country and not enough ammunition for one day's battle. The News says, and we agree with it, that there ought to be 100,000 rifles and a good supply of ammunition. Also, common sense dictates that our great Atlantic and Pacific ports, now defenceless, should be supplied with modern guns for their defence.

The settlement between Britain and France has revived the movement for a railway tunnel across the Channel, which was first proposed by a French engineer more than a hundred years ago. The late Prince Consort, Mr. Cobden, Lord Derby, Lord Beaconsfield, Lord Clarendon, Mr. Gladstone and others favored the project and in 1874 the British Parliament chartered a company to construct it. In the following year the French Chamber sanctioned a similar company with a like object. Work was actually begun and over a mile of tunnel on each side excavated when military alarms were raised. Lord Walseley openly opposed it and worked was stopped. It is estimated the tunnel would cost \$50,000,000. About 1,200,000 persons yearly cross the Channel between the two countries and the number is steadily increasing. Of these it is estimated that \$70,000 would prefer the tunnel to steamer, while there would also be a large goods traffic, together ensuring that the work would pay a fair return on its cost.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is being severely taken to task by the Opposition press for having spoken of Lord Dunderdale as "a foreigner." The Hansard report shows that while Sir Wilfrid did use the word he immediately withdrew it. Here is the official record:

Sir Wilfrid Laurier—Lord Dunderdale, in his position, is charged with the organization of the militia, but he must take counsel here when organizing a regiment. He is a foreigner—no. Some hon. Members. No, no. Sir Wilfrid Laurier. I had withdrawn the expression before hon. gentlemen interrupted. He is not a foreigner, but he is a stranger. Some hon. Members. No. Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Yes, he does not know the people of the eastern townships, where these light dragoons are to be enlisted.
