Letter From 105

The following letter has been received by Miss Maggie Hayter, High Bank, P. E. I., from her uncle, Sergt. James Hayter, of the 105th Battalion now training in England:

Sept. 16, 1916.

Dear niece—Just a few lines in answer to your most kind and welcome letter. I know that Henry (her brother) is writing regularly and that you get the news through him that we are all right. He is getting along fine, is growing big and looks hardy, a regular brick, you would feel proud to see him. And just think when the 105th fired at the ranges at Valcartier Henry was one of the best, if not the best shot in the Battalion. Perhaps he did not tell you that. Well, a few questions which I will endeavor to answer. The weather and climate are, I think, about the same as in P. E. I., as far as I have seen. It was very hot here through August, but since September came in it has been lovely, just cool enough to be comfortable, and a fair share of rain. This is a beautiful country, and when seen it is quite easy to understand why the British always fought so valiantly to save it from the invaders. As for fruit, there is not much growing wild, as the land is pretty much all cleared. All I have seen growing wild was some blackberries, but there are lovely orchards with lots of fruit. The price of fruit at the stores is very high. Everything is pretty high except clothing, about one-third or one-half of what it is in Canada. Well, the Battalion parades for divine service on Sunday mornings at 8.30. Sometimes there are three or four battalions together, and probably two or three chaplains. When one gets tired preaching the other takes a spell. Every one that is not on duty must attend this parade. In the afternoon and evening everybody can go to church where they like, and there is quite a number of churches within range. I went to a Baptist church about one and a half miles from here with a good preacher and good singing—very homelike. We generally go there on Sunday evenings at 6.30. I have been attending a military school for the last seven weeks and just got back to the Battalion today. I was taking a course in military engineering. I worked and studied hard. There were 24 of us in the class, one other sergeant from the

105th besides myself. The rest were from other battalions. In all there were nineteen battalions represented. We had our examinations yesterday, and I had the satisfaction of qualifying with good marks. All the rest of the boys are getting along well as far as I know. Everyone is in good cheer. We are all well, fed and comfortably quartered. We are trying hard to get to France as a unit. I don't know whether we will or not. We had a lovely trip coming across, took nine days, but it was calm and fine every day. Some of the things one will notice in this country are the solid appearance of the houses, all built of brick, the roofs covered with slate or brick shingles; next, the splendid roads, mostly built of broken stone and crushed down with heavy steam rollers; next, the lovely hedges everywhere, the most beautiful hedges along the roads, around the houses and gardens, and all so nicely kept. And the shade trees, mostly oak and chestnut, not a few but lots of them everywhere along the road, line fences in fields, everywhere beautiful large shade trees. You see they have been growing a long time, the most of them, and they are large. Next, the large flocks of sheep, here is where you see the shepherding with his dogs and watching his flock. I started to count a flock one day. I got away up in the hundreds but had to give it up. Also the herds of cattle, very large, fine cattle. The best of the horses are taken for very purposes; the angle worms, so large and fat and numerous. You see we have been doing some trench digging. And, last but not least, the frankness of the people. Everything over here is Jack blunt, apparently no deception whatever. If a person is good, all right—if bad, no bones made whatever about owning up to it. And the splendid confidence of the people, the women and old men and the unit, working in the fields, while those able to bear arms are away fighting for their country. I used sometimes to wonder how the British nation made such a prominent place for itself among the nations of the world. It is the confidence in themselves and the unconquerable spirit of right, and the splendid country they have to fight for. One of the finest sights I have seen here was in the big-making time—six old men, about the age of our good neighbor (Mr. D. McLean), making a stack of hay; hearty, healthy, rosy cheeked, and cheerful. It was a sight I shall never forget. Of course, when comparing this country with Canada one must remember that this is an old country, civilized and settled for many hundreds of years, while Canada is but a new country, with great possibilities ahead, not forgetting our own little island. I have not seen anything that I would swap for it yet.

Well, I am anxious to get to see London. You see, everyone is entitled to a six days' pass after they come over here, to go anywhere in England, Ireland, or Scotland, and their way paid both ways. Henry got his and went to London, but I was away to school and missed mine when a Coy. week I was in hopes to get mine, but there are no passes being given now, and I may not get mine at all. Henry had a splendid trip to London;

A PASTOR DIES IN HIS PULPIT.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11.—"I would die to prove the truth of the Bible."

The Rev. Thomas C. Needham closed his sermon with this simple expression of faith as he stood in his pulpit in the Bethlehem Baptist church, Eighteenth and York streets, this morning.

His face glowed with the glory of his belief as he looked out over the congregation and slowly raised his hands in benediction. The mellowed light of the noon sun straggled through the stained glass windows and shed a radiance over all.

A new grave seemed to fill his frame worn by the burden of 64 years. A profound, peaceful silence fell upon the church. And then he lowered his hands, reeled against the pulpit rail and slipped to the floor, dead.

(Rev. Mr. Needham was a brother of Mrs. G. Hevenor, of St. John, a native of Ireland. In his youth he saw service with the British navy and later was for a short time a resident of St. John. He has preached here on different occasions.
