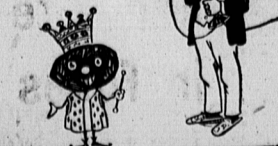

Summerside

Welcomes Vice-Regal Party

Summerside accorded a right royal welcome to their Excellencies Viscount and Viscountess Willingdon upon their arrival at 1 o'clock Friday. The town had an appropriate patriotic dress, and all the buildings were bedecked with flags and patriotic bunting. Their Excellencies were accompanied by Mrs. R. B. Osborne, lady-in-waiting to Her Excellency; Mr. E. C. Miville, secretary to the Governor-General; Captain C. S. Price-Davies, M.C.; Capt. the Hon. J. C. Pervis, M.C.; Capt. the Viscount Harding, A.D.C. to His Excellency; Lieut.-Col. G. Elliot Full, A.D.C. to His Excellency in this province; and in attendance, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, with his A.D.C. Col. J. P. Hooper, Premier Stewart and others, came to Summerside with the Vice-Regal party. Upon arrival their Excellencies proceeded to the Dominion Park where the following address from the Mayor and Town Councilors was read by Hon. J. E. Wyatt, K.C.:

To His Excellency the Right Honorable Viscount Willingdon, Knight Grand Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Grand Commander of the Most Eminent Order of the India Empire, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada.

May I please Your Excellency. "The Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Summerside on behalf of its inhabitants beg to extend to your Excellency and the esteemed Viscountess Willingdon a hearty welcome to our midst.

"When we learned that your Excellency had been selected as the Governor-General of our Dominion, we were exultant that one so eminent and distinguished for his service to our King and Country had been chosen as its representative, and considering that sixty and three years ago representatives of five scattered and disconnected British Colonies sat and consulted at the Capital of our Island as to a closer Union, and from that conference and the vision of The Fathers of Confederation, we are today a country extending from ocean to ocean—the granary of the world—and second to none in the diversity and extent of our natural resources. The right arm of The British Commonwealth of Nations, we conceive that your Commission as representative of the Crown was a worthy appreciation and acknowledgment of your illustrious acts in the service of your country.

"We do not forget, however, that the position we now occupy among the nations of the world was not attained by our efforts alone, but under the guidance, protection and assistance of the Mother Country, and in her hour of deep distress, our boys gratefully volunteered to serve her in the far-off fields of Flanders. They did not all return, and many homes there are in this fair Isle of ours where vacant chairs speak eloquently of unflinching heroism that she might live.

"Today we welcome you as the Representative of our King, and wish you to convey to His Majesty, an expression of our appreciation of our British connection and our continuing loyalty to the Crown. We also desire to express the wish that this visit of your Excellencies to our Province may always be fruitful of pleasant recollections of the occasion.

His Excellency the Governor-General replied as follows: Mr. Mayor and Councilors of the Town of Summerside. Let me thank you at once, on behalf of my wife and myself, for the cordiality of the welcome you have extended to us both today. I can meeting held.

assure you that we are both delighted to have this opportunity of paying a visit to Summerside and to see the beauties of the surrounding country.

You have, as you have so rightly said, Mr. Mayor, every reason to be proud of the wonderful achievements of your country during the past sixty years, and after my experience of life here for a few short months, I am confident that at the end of the next sixty years, far greater achievements will have been attained.

It is a great pleasure to me to hear you speak of the guidance, protection and assistance Canada has received in the past years from the Mother Country. Let me assure you that there is no citizen in the Mother Country who will ever forget the wonderful service and sacrifice given to her by Canada, in her direst and most anxious hour of need, during the years of the Great War. I am a proud man to be the personal representative of His Majesty in Canada, and shall do my best to help you during the years that it is my privilege to live amongst you. It is my earnest hope that Prince Edward Island may have her full share of the increasing prosperity and progress that I feel sure is going to be the lot of Canada in the near future.

I was delighted to hear you express such loyal sentiments towards our beloved Sovereign King George, and towards the great British Empire, to which we are all so proud to belong, and you may rest assured that I shall take the earliest opportunity of conveying to His Majesty your message of unswerving loyalty and devotion.

Once again, Mr. Mayor, let me thank you very sincerely, on behalf of my wife and myself, for your very generous welcome to us both. May I say that we both hope that today is but the forerunner of other visits to your charming town.

After luncheon at the Clifton House, the Vice-Regal Party left via Bedouque on return to Charlottetown.

Weather Conditions Nearly Alike in 1882-1927

Historicus.

The weather conditions of 1882 were very much like those we are having in the present year. The farmer had a long winter and a late spring, lasting till the middle of June. The moisture and heat and cold, also differed very slightly. In 1882, it was necessary to keep the fires going on Dominion Day and immediately before and after. We remember hearing of the farmers feeling much alarm over the crop prospects. Vegetation, except on old hay fields was very backward, while this year the weather is encouraging according to recent reports; likewise the prospects of the crops suddenly took a turn in 1882 and vegetation came on rapidly, every kind of crop making satisfactory progress and yielding returns as abundantly as if nothing unusual had happened.

Our experience this year since the snow disappeared has been backward weather, frequent light rains, cold and moderate winds. It is reckoned that the harvest will not come in earlier than the end of August. The light rains have retarded seeding, but on the whole except in low lands the seeding was forced through with surprising rapidity, and if all goes well for the next few months the harvest will be reaped at much the same date as usual. All over good promise of a splendid hay crop is presented, and the mower will be put in order at about the regular time of cutting that crop.

The potato crop under the new boom is all in the land, and seeding under the old system closed a week or two ago, according to the "lay of the land," all the planters having high hope of a splendid return. There is an extensive area planted in the usual way and an increased area has been planted by the large growers. Great expectations are felt for the success of the whole season's seeding, a hope in which all are united.

The fishing industry gave promise at the outset of a bountiful return, but we learn from reports that the high winds did some damage to the gear and prevented the fisherman from making as large a catch as rewarded them in past years. However, too many are prone to see and hear the dark side of flying news, and therefore these reports are not worthy of much credence.

We also learn that favorable prospects of a good season's canning of fish and fruit may be expected. In regard to fruit-canning it is too early yet to make accurate calculations, but the opinions of experienced pickers and canners all tend to inspire high hopes of a profitable season's operations.

The usual activities are reported at all points and commercial centres of the province. All the merchants and traders are feeling sanguine of remunerative business prospects. It is yet early in the season, but the facilities of commerce are now so far superior to past times that business keeps moving in sympathy with the methods of the day.

The outlook, then, is most favorable and every Islander can rest assured that the resources of the province will not fail them, will reward their efforts this year as well as in the most fruitful days of the past.
