Break Or Sabotage Suspected At S'side Vendor Shop

Whether a break was attempted at Summerside's new vendor shop over the week-end or an enemy attempted to sabotage its operation has not yet been ascertained but when the employees arrived at work yesterday morning it was found impossible to insert keys in the locks of either of the doors. In order to gain admittance to the building it was necessary for a carpenter from Holman's to remove the wire or steel mesh that covers the glass in one of the doors and then to remove the glass and climb in and open a door from the inside. When the locks were more completely examined pieces of wire or thin strands of tin were removed from each of them. It could have been an amateurish attempt to pick the locks but it was more likely the work of some persons performing what they considered to be a practical joke.

Body Of Murdered Radio Man Found

SALONIKA, Greece, May 16 (AP) - The bullet-pierced, trust-aided body of George Polk, American radio correspondent who had tried to arrange a secret meeting with the leader of the Greek guerrillas, was found floating today in Salonika Bay. Polk, 34, disappeared a week ago. He had told friends he hoped to take an underground route to the guerrilla-held mountains in the north and interview Markos Vilaras, rebel chieftain, for the Columbia Broadcasting System. Police officials said Polk was shot through the back of the head and dumped into Salonika Bay with his hands and legs bound with twine.
