Mr. Jenkins has a number of new pictures and fresh anecdotes for next Tuesday.

The two coastal steamers Harlaw and City of Ghent, of the Pickford & Black service, went into commission Tuesday. There have been a number of changes among the officers of the ships. Captain Robert Hickman remains in charge of the Harlaw. His chief officer is Marston Bethel, formerly of the Ormoco. J. McDonald, formerly of the Beta, is second mate, and E. C. Haggarty is purser. Robert Blair is chief engineer, and John Simms, late of the Beta, is second engineer. The City of Ghent is again in command of Captain John Hare. A Fougere is first mate, and Herman Jamieson is second officer. G. Daniels goes as chief engineer, and F. E. Covey as purser. The City of Ghent has sailed on her old route. She had a full cargo.

Pictou County, N.S., has gone the limit in automobile exclusion, for by a resolution passed a few days ago by the County Council, every day but Monday is closed season for owners of buzz wagons. Two counties in Nova Scotia have so far excluded autos under the Act passed at the last session of the Legislature. Cumberland dealt less stringently with the machines, only prohibiting their operation on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays. Prince County, like this Province has long had a violent antipathy to autos and some of the ladies of that County, who indulge in driving, have had unpleasant experiences and when the County Council met recently it decided to bet the autos run only on the day when the cars of the wash tub would be occupying the ladies.

A correspondent in the eastern part of the Province writes: The last week of April and sleighs still on the roads drifts and snowbank will prevent wheeled traffic for a few days yet. Sleighs crossed Black Pond ice till the 26th, something later than the average. The ice has entirely disappeared from the Gulf waters here and the fishermen anticipating a good season are making extensive preparations. All the old firms are moving shoreward, an one new firm, George and Leslie Jarvis, are starting at Red Point. George arrived recently from the United States. Mrs. Patterson and two children and Mrs. Eleanor McDonald, daughter of an esteemed fellow-resident, Theophilus McDonald, have arrived home from Chelsea, Mass. They were there for a week. A cousin of theirs also, Mrs. Story, nee Ella Robertson, had much of her property burned. A two-year-old daughter of Ezra Fraser's died on the 24th, and Mrs. John A. Morrow dropped dead on the 25th. James Smith of Webster's Corner, spent a few days east recently.

Later in the evening the society and their guests sat down to supper in the Halifax Hotel. The company that surrounded the tables numbered about 100. A. S. Barnstead, Halifax, was in the chair. After proposing a toast to the King, which was duly honored, Mr. Barnstead read telegrams and letters of regret at inability to be present from a large number of persons among which was one from Prof. Theo. Ross of this City.

The following "Notes for Farmers, for May," are sent out by John Pixter, Farm Superintendent, MacDonald College: 1. Do not be in a hurry to let the animals on the pastures 2. Get carrots, mangles, sugar mangles, sugar beets and vegetables sown early this month. Sow plenty of seed. It is easier to thin out than to transplant. 3. Corn Land: If was not prepared last Autumn and especially if there be much or grass in the land. Work the surface thoroughly before planting. 4. Sowing Corn: Watch for a warm condition of soil. Quick germination is desirable. Sow fairly thick, then thin out in June. 5. Harrow the corn land lightly and thoroughly just before the corn comes up; also after it is well up, and thus save hoeing, and hasten the growth. Use a slanting tooth harrow. 6. Plant some pumpkins in the corn, or roots after they are up. 7. If clover has not been sown with wheat, oats, barley or peas, harrow all with a slanting tooth harrow, when the crops are 6 to 8 inches high. 8. If any part of the meadow has been winter-killed, plough up and re-sow with spring rye or barley. 9. Bees. Examine all colonies. See that they have a good laying queen and plenty of stores. 10. Between fruit and clover bloom, uncap one side of a frame of honey each alternate evening keep up brood rearing. Strong colonies in May give best results. 11. Open all windows of the cellar and root house. If in use put on screens. 12. A coating of whitewash will do the cellar good.

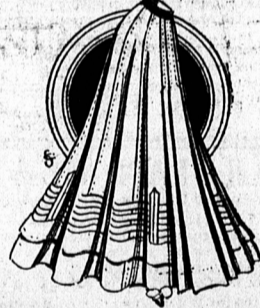
