Severe Quakes In Montserrat

(By Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)

PLYMOUTH, Montserrat, May 20.—While earthquake shocks continued to rock Montserrat over the week-end, authorities announced the British naval cruiser Dundee would reach Plymouth Tuesday and stand off the island to "meet any emergency."

The announcement brought a measure of relief to Montserrat's residents, terrified for days by intermittent tremors severe enough to drive scores of persons to sleep in the open air for fear their homes would be destroyed.

One of the strongest quakes occurred last night at seven o'clock, shaking buildings for several minutes. It was followed by a shorter but equally intense tremor at 8.30, which day since the shocks began on May 2 the most severe shock has been felt between these hours.

Last Monday there were four distinct tremors, all heavy, and several lighter ones. And each day since they have continued with undiminished force.

Authorities have been unable to explain the cause. General belief is that the shocks have been caused by some nearby volcanic disturbance, or by a submarine upheaval in the Atlantic. And the continued vigor of the quakes has aroused fears that more violent tremors are in the making.

The community has joined in prayer for their cessation. Last week clergymen of the Anglican, Roman Catholic and Methodist led hundreds of members of their churches in an open air service of humiliation in the public square surrounding Plymouth's war memorial.

Rev. Theodore Ross Goes to Kingston

General regret is felt not only by the congregation of the Newtown-Waterford circuit of the United Church, in which he and his family have played a vital part during the last six years, but by citizens of all creeds in Kings County, that Rev. Theodore Ross and Mrs. Ross and family will leave Sussex Corner for Kingston, N. S., within the next six weeks, where Mr. Ross has accepted the pastorate of the United Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Ross have made themselves beloved not only by the members of the Newtown-Waterford circuit, to the spiritual advancement of which both have devoted their time most unselfishly, but by the citizens in general on account of the active interest they have taken in all movements for the benefit of the community, agriculturally, socially, in the interest of the parishes and schools and also in sports.

Mr. Ross, who was born at Bedeque, N. S., spent two years studying at Guilford Agricultural College and later was secretary of agriculture for Prince Edward Island, which enabled him to enter more deeply into the everyday life of his parishioners.

Graduating from Dalhousie University, Halifax, in 1899, he attended the Agricultural College in Guilford in 1900-01, following which he took a teachers' course at Columbia University and was appointed lecturer at Chataqua, New York. Returning home, he married Mrs. Florence Annear.

Following a theological course at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, he was called in 1919 to the Presbyterian Church at River Hebert, N. S., and later held the pastorate at Shemogue, N. B., from which church he accepted the call to the United Church in 1928.

Active in all affairs pertaining to his ministerial duties in the United Church, of which he is chairman of the Maritime settlement committee, says the Saint John Telegraph-Journal, he has found time to be active as a Mason, Orangeman, Odd Fellow and Forester. He is chairman of the Pine Hill Alumni, was field manager of the successful \$2,000,000 campaign for funds for Dalhousie University in 1928, and for many years served on the national executive of the Red Cross Society.

Since coming to Sussex, he was active in organizing and served as president of the Sussex Luncheon Club and is a valued member of the Sussex Board of Trade and Sussex and Studholm Agricultural Society. While active in matters pertaining to church, school and civic and community welfare, he has found time to take a deep interest in the Sussex Corner Boy Scout troop, and has organized horsehoe pitching and checker clubs at Sussex Corner.

Motorboat Capsized Three Drowned

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 21.—Thrown into the water when their motorboat capsized, three men were drowned Sunday off Branch in St. Mary's Bay.

A boat picked up the body of Charles Nash several hours later. No trace was found of David J. Nash and Patrick Mooney, Jr., two companions on a trip to Point Lance. The accident occurred as the men, all residents of Branch, were returning home after discharging a cargo of freight at Point Lance, about 10 miles down the bay.

Villagers believe their little boat kept too close to shore on the return voyage, and was overturned by the strong offshore wind. Mooney was single; the other two victims were married.

Prince Does Not Attend British Legion Opening

WESTON-SUPER-MARE, England, May 21.—Condemnation was treated at the opening of the annual conference of the British Legion when it was revealed that Prince George had declined to attend "in view of press reports in which unfortunate prominence was recently given of apparent attempts to cause dissension in the Legion."

The incident was a sequel to newspaper reports of dissatisfaction in certain branches of the Legion, which were said to have complained of "officialdom." Major-General Sir Frederick Maurice, Legion President, read the Prince's letter to the convention.

He was deeply grieved, Sir Frederick said, but not surprised at the letter. He could well understand that when the executive of the Legion was being publicly attacked in the press, Royal Princes should hesitate before giving even the slightest appearance of taking sides in a matter of which they had no knowledge or concern.

A suggestion by Sir Frederick that a loyal message be sent Prince George was greeted with roars of approval.

Chac Kung Back From England

MONTREAL, May 20.—The abbot Chac Kung, the Erasmian Tibetan Lincolin, tonight celebrated for Vancouver following his arrival here in the liner Duchess of York from England.

Refused permission to land in England by the British government, the Buddhist monk and his party of nine disciples were returned to Canada. They will take ship at the Pacific Coast for China.

As a deportee, Lincolin, once notorious as an enemy of England during the days of the Great War, could have obtained his return trip to Canada free of charge. He insisted, however, on paying steerage passage fares for himself and party.

Lincolin would give no interviews here, merely passing out the printed cards on which are recorded his opinions of newspapermen. The opinions are not complimentary to the craft.

To the colorful life of this former member of many religious faiths must now be added his quick trip abroad. He reached Canada 22 days after he left it, from Saint John, N. B., bound for England and the continent. Before his departure he wired Premier Ramsay MacDonald that he was prepared to swear fealty to King George. But apparently the British authorities were not impressed. Upon their arrival at Liverpool he was arrested and held until the same ship returned to Canada.

Former member of the British House of Commons this man, born a Jew in Hungary, embraced the faith of Protestantism in Montreal, became a Presbyterian in Montreal, an Anglican in Halifax and eventually a Buddhist in China.

Of the 10 monks and nuns who accompanied him to England so that a Buddhist colony could be established at Lake Constance, Switzerland, nine returned with Lincolin, the 10th crossing to Germany.

Pope Pius Condemns Pagan Movement

VATICAN CITY, May 21.—Pope Pius XI, speaking to 5,000 German pilgrims, today vigorously condemned what he termed a pagan movement in Germany.

The remarks were made in the course of a colorful ceremony which elevated a humble lay brother, who for 40 years had been doorman at a German Capuchin monastery, to sainthood. The canonization of the doorman, Conrad of Farzham, took place at St. Peter's in the presence of 19 cardinals and a number of German bishops.

"The life of Conrad of Farzham is an admonition to all those who have wandered far from the truth and seek to restore and magnify with phrases the practices and customs of paganism; and who repudiate Christian doctrine which alone can recall them to virtue, civilization and the true processes," His Holiness said.
