Drillon Officially Crowned League Leading Scorer

MONTREAL, March 23—(CP)—Nobody had any doubt about it since the volunteer statisticians figured things out after the schedule closed, but just to settle it for the records the National Hockey League bestowed its official 1937-38 scoring crown tonight on Gordie Drillon of Toronto Maple Leafs.

After a season of travelling at better than a goal-a-game clip, the young second-year wing man came up with a point total of 52 to beat out teammate Syl Apps by a couple of spots. More than that, his 25 actual tallies were good enough to lead the league by three in the goal-getting department.

Apps wound up with 21 goals and 29 assists, to stamp himself the league's leading helper on scores. Second to him in this division came Art Chapman of Americans with 27.

Paul Thompson of Chicago Black Hawks, speeding down the stretch with a great finishing drive, wound up at the top of the American division, his 22 goals and 22 assists giving him a five-point edge on Cecil Dillon of New York Rangers and Bill Cowley of Boston Bruins.

Bucky Red Horner of Toronto, who started off the season in the throes of a reformation, turned bad man before the schedule was well under way and wound up as leading penalty getter. His 22 minutes on the mourner's bench was two up on Art Coulter of Rangers, though the fact Coulter spent his first defeat on Madison Square Gardens' canvas court.
