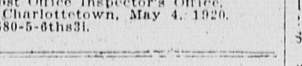

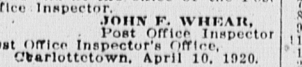

It was with burning cheeks that I

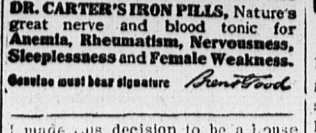

SALMON SHORTAGE ON YUKON RIVER. Future Supply May Be Menaced—Floating Cannery Established.

Officials of the Department of Indian Affairs report that the catch of salmon at Yukon Indian centres last year are much smaller than usual, although, fortunately, the shortage has not been sufficiently acute to create serious conditions.

The decrease in the catch of salmon is attributed to the operations of a floating cannery at the mouth of the Yukon river. The most disturbing feature is that the establishment of a large cannery at this point is likely to seriously effect the future fish supply in the upper waters of the Yukon.

Last year's scarcity of salmon in the Yukon did not result in extreme hardship on the Indians, but it is pointed out that, had game been scarce at some of the centres, as occasionally happens, the situation would have been a very serious one.

The effect was most pronounced at Rampart house, situated 200 miles up the Porcupine river, where there was almost a total lack of salmon last season and the Indians were unable to dry any for winter use. It is essential that the food supply of the Yukon Indian centres, of which salmon is a very important item, be not endangered by cannery operations of such a nature as to imperil this means of subsistence.

HINTS FOR The Motorist BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH

DISTRIBUTING GREASE IN HOUSINGS



H. S. C. writes: My new car has been run about 3,700 miles and the grease in the transmission, universal-joint and differential-housing has not been changed. Should not this be done soon? It is advisable to clean out all the old grease before putting in new?

Answer: It would have been well to have changed it before this, especially as your car is a new one. Manufacturers frequently advise renewing the lubricant in housing as often as every 2,000 miles and in universal joints every 1,000 miles.

However, no harm has probably been done in your case, if there is plenty of grease in the housings and that of sufficiently fluid—a quality to distribute over all working parts. By taking the car into a warm place, much of the grease can be drawn out by removing the draw-off plug and the remainder can mostly be removed by putting kerosene into the housing, running the transmission with one wheel jacked up and then drawing off the kerosene.

The old lubricant, if liquid enough, can be filtered through fine wire gauze and used again. You better follow the instruction book as to the quality of lubricant used, but avoid too stiff grease.

NO SPARK IN TWO CYLINDERS. C. G. W. writes: Can you tell me why I get no spark in cylinders one and six of my engine? I have substituted in these cylinders plugs which have been sparking properly but they do not work.

Answer: The most natural suggestion is that the plug-cables to these cylinders have broken down insulation and that the high-tension current escapes from them to ground, or that the inside of the distributor is dirty and the current discharges across therein. Are you sure that the center connection to the distributor rotor is in good condition and that the rotor button, which travels over the segments, is all right? How about the adjustment of the timer contacts, is the gap there of the right length? If the spark is good in the other four cylinders, it should be in one and six. If the matters referred to above are taken care of.
