MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

(Continued)

Mr R. G. Strathie moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr W. I. Green, and carried.

Whereas it has come to the notice of this Presbytery that a persistent agitation through the press and otherwise is being made by certain parties for the running of regular trains on the Government Railway system throughout the Maritime Provinces necessitating Sunday steam boat connection with this Island; And whereas this Presbytery believes that such an innovation is unnecessary and would tend to greatly interrupt and destroy the sanctity and restfulness of the day, and would be contrary to the overwhelming sentiment of the people of this Province. Therefore resolved that the Presbytery of P. E. Island in regular session convened express its opposition to the running of such trains, and its hope that the managing board of the Government Railway will steadily and persistently refuse to entertain such a proposition. Further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to such managing

board. Mr T. C. James reported the session records of Covehead as neatly and correctly kept, and they were accordingly attested by the moderator. It was decided to ask the Home Mission Committee to pay balance due for pupil supply at Georgetown. Messrs W. H. Spencer, convener, John Hawley, T. F. Fullerton, Geo. E. Ross and T. C. James were appointed a committee to consider and report on matters to which the attention of all Presbyteries is directed as on page 4 of assembly minutes for 1909.

Mr S. D. McPhee moved the following resolution which was duly seconded and carried.

Whereas the courts have in many cases interpreted the clauses of the Criminal Code intended to prohibit professional book-makers from negotiating bets in such a way as to make this lawful on a race track if the book-makers move about, while unlawful if he remains in any building, booth, or place, thus defeating the manifest intention of Parliament and making the law ridiculous and non effective in its operations.

And whereas many of the American States and cities have placed a legal ban on professional gaming, making the Dominion of Canada the dumping ground for criminals and gamblers, whereby our boys and young men are in grave danger, and the safety and happiness of our country imperilled by the demoralizing influence.

And whereas the Board of Moral and social reform co-operating with the Christian Churches has for two years been earnestly pressing the Dominion Government to ask Parliament to amend the Criminal Code to make it more effective in vanishing the gambling evil from our land.

Therefore resolved that this Presbytery express its unqualified disapprobation of the action of the Government in refusing to accede to this reasonable request, and earnestly appeal to our people to use every legitimate influence with the Government and members of Parliament to secure the enactment of such legislation as will effectually suppress these great evils which are a menace to the welfare and prosperity of our country.

Whereas under the present Criminal Code of Canada habitual open and notorious adultery and lewd cohabitation are not unlawful. And whereas these shameful vices are unlawful in most of the frontier American States, and many of those guilty of these offences are flocking into Canada where they can continue their vicious lives without fear of punishment. And whereas many of the immigrants coming to our shores hold shockingly loose views regarding the sexual relations thus endangering the sanctity of marriage and the foundation of national virtue. Therefore resolved that this Presbytery would respectfully and earnestly urge the Federal Government to ask Parliament to amend the Code so as to protect Canadian society against those vices which poison our national life-blood and imperil the sacred institutions of the home.

Copies of these resolutions to be forwarded to the Premier of Canada, the Minister of Justice, the Secretary of State, and the Senators and Members representing Prince Edward Island. Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Georgetown on Thursday 4th instant at seven thirty p. m., of which public intimation was made, and this sederunt was closed with the benediction.

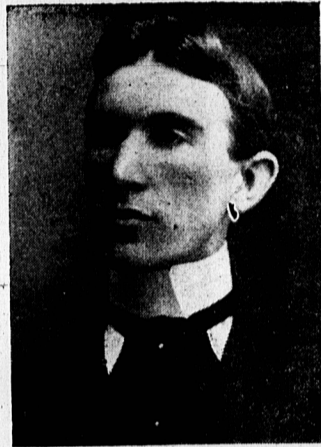
