NEW TARIFF LAW ENACTED BY CHINESE

United States Merchants, Sorely Depressed, Decide on Strong Protest to Washington.

(Special to the Guardian) SHANGHAI, July 27.—The Nanking national government took the final plunge today in the direction of tariff autonomy, and ignoring the treaties and foreign merchants protests, published a complete luxury tariff list with schedules running from 15 to 60 percent.

United States merchants, sorely distressed held a meeting yesterday and decided on a strong protest to Washington but local and official authorities did not hold out much hope for itself, except the possibility of inducing the nationalists to postpone the enactment of the new law for several months in order to enable the readjustments to be taken in care of.

British Expert Arrives in Ottawa

He was unable to take his place as vacation judge at the beginning of July on account of illness and thereafter did not return to Osgoode Hall.

World's Largest Aeroplane Being Built in Germany

(Special to the Guardian) NEW YORK, N. Y., July 27.—The largest aeroplane in the world is now being constructed by Dornier at Friedrichshafen, Germany. It is a huge flying bird made entirely of metal, and will carry 100 passengers. It will weigh loaded 50 tons or 100,000 pounds, of which half will be useful load, that is passengers, fuel and equipment.

1,000 Deaths Reported in British India

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 27.—An unconfirmed report from Amherabad, Bombay presidency, British India, states that 1,000 deaths occurred in the native state of Baroda as the result of a reservoir, fifteen square miles in area bursting its banks and flooding surrounding villages. Communications between Bombay and Baroda are cut off.

Mussolini's Cap Of Fate Proves True

(By British United Press) ROME, July 27.—A disclosure, which many people regard as an explanation of Mussolini's escapes from attempts on his life, is arousing considerable discussion in Italy. For many years Il Duce has carried with him a white skull cap which belonged to Pope Pius X, known as "The Saint."

PARLIAMENTARY OPPOSITION TO NEW PRAYER BOOK

LONDON, July 27.—Parliamentary opposition to the new prayer book was indicated by a meeting of 70 members of the House of Commons of all parties, presided over by Ronald McNellie, financial secretary of the treasury, which passed a resolution favoring the taking of steps to oppose the measure in the House of Commons.

Bank Loan Practice

Coote, of Edmonton, Alta., in speaking to the resolution, said that he found where banks had a monopoly in various places they charged arbitrary amounts for the handling of a merchant's accounts while in other places no charge was made.

Pawnshop in Famous English School

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 27.—Dr. Cyril Norwood, headmaster of Harrow School, combines his scholastic duties with those of a pawnbroker. The pawnbroking business is an old-established one. It is, indeed, so old that no one in Harrow except Dr. Norwood and the police knew of it until the other day, when a press representative called on him to pledge his watch with the headmaster, and thus became his first customer.

LEADING BRITISH LAWYER EARNS \$300,000 A YEAR

LONDON, July 27.—The maximum yearly income of the great British lawyers is \$300,000, according to an estimate compiled by the London Evening Standard. This peak is touched at the present time by only one barrister, Sir John Simon.

INDIAN MARKET FOR BISCUITS

BACK DRIVE UPON PRICE SLASHING

Impost Sought on Mail Order Houses by Convention in Saint John.

SAINT JOHN, July 27.—Resolutions asking for a further reduction in sales tax; a tax on mail order houses; a prosecution of firms deceiving the public by fraudulent advertising; protesting against the reduction in parcel post rates and a decision to co-operate with other associations in the remedying of price-cutting on nationally advertised goods, were some of the most important resolutions adopted at the meeting of the Dominion Board of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, held in the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening, concluding the second day of their convention in the city.

World's Poultry Congress Opened in Canadian Capital

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, July 27.—With forty two countries officially represented the third World's Poultry Congress was opened in the Canadian capital this morning. Nearly five thousand people, including delegates and members from five continents were present, when Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture for Canada, initiated proceedings.

Centenarian Puzzle

(By British United Press) PARIS, July 27.—The Paris police are trying to solve an identification puzzle, the central figure in which is a reputed centenarian. Jean Baptiste Tourenne, a retired railwayman who for more than 40 years has drawn a pension from the State Railway, has, according to his 100th birthday, entered the world on his 100th birthday. He is still in the best of health, and though his mouth is white and his hair is only slightly grey and he looks no older than 60. He was preparing to celebrate his centenary when the manager of an railway company stated that Jean Baptiste was not a centenarian but was the 60-year-old son of Jean Baptiste. The son was supposed to have died in 1900. Father and son, said the writer, had the same name, and since 1900 the father, whose pension he has been drawing.

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31,000 Harvesters Required by Western Canada

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Man., July 27.—Approximately 31,000 harvesters from eastern Canada and the Pacific Coast will be required by Western Canada to garner this year's crop. This estimate was arrived at during a meeting of representatives of the railway, the labor bureau of the three prairie provinces and the government employment services. The first call for harvest help last year was for 58,000.
