THE LATE DONALD DOGKERTY.

Donald Dogkerty, passed away on the 10th of February, in his 81st year, being the oldest and only surviving son of a family of nine children. His parents came to this country with the celebrated three hundred pioneer settlers from England. His father, Angus Dogkerty was a direct descendant of the House of Stuart, his grandmother being Annie Stuart, and her father was cousin to King Charles. From his mother, Catherine McLeod he could claim kinship to the historical character, Lord McLeod of the Portier, in the Highlands, whose earl still stands; also of the two McLeods made celebrated as officers in the famous "Scottish Greys" in the battle of Waterloo.

His education was obtained chiefly under the tutelage of an elderly Scotchman named Arbuckle, a learned man, but with some peculiarities which, together with his genuine worth keep his memory still green in the hearts of his few surviving pupils and friends in Belfast.

He married in 1846 Miss Jennie Panting, a most estimable lady, daughter of the late Francis Panting of Oxford, England, and Jennie Fraser, of Inverness, Scotland.

In his younger days Mr. Dogkerty was well known as captain and pilot along the coast. He always designed as well as owned the vessels in which he sailed, and was master of them on the sea. Some of the older inhabitants of Belfast will remember the pleasant trips made in his company, sailing from Charlottetown to

Belfast; for though a trader he always came in a port loaded with passengers. For the last twenty years Mr. Dogkerty led a retired life on the old homestead, but being by nature a builder and manager of boats it cannot be said that he was a great success as farmer.

Nine children survive him: five daughters and four sons. The oldest, now Mrs. E. Paige is living in Boston, Mass., the next older, Mrs. Arthur E. Gault, is also a resident of Boston; Mrs. George E. Goff resides in Woodville, and Mrs. A. Sutherland is living at Carriagar; while Katie, the youngest and unmarried, who has been his nurse and house-keeper since her childhood is still at the homestead.

There are many living today who will heartily concur with me when I say that during all the course of his long life Mr. Dogkerty was never known to do a dishonest act or to take advantage of another's misfortune. He was a generous, tender-hearted man and a useful and loyal citizen, an active member of the Presbyterian Church from his early youth; a strong type of the old Scottish families.

He was buried in the family lot at Georgetown, by the side of the faithful companion of so many years; friends, as they looked their last upon his old familiar face, lined by the finger of Time, and whose features still showed traces of his loving, generous nature, felt that never for them could his place be filled as friend and neighbor.

are healed in during the autumn in a cool cellar in moist sand.

Grafting may be done any time during the winter—whip or tongue grafting is the method usually employed. As only the root is required the trunk and branches are cut off and thrown away.

The grafts are then packed away in damp saw-dust till time for planting out in the spring which should be deep enough in the ground so that only one bud or the tip of the scion appears above ground. One shoot only should be allowed to grow the first season.—Acadian.
